We are indebted to a gentleman in this city, for the sewing dispatch, received here yesterday : Connessione, July 22 .- The enemy has been intercepted ad cut off. THE RAID BELOW .- Sheriff High, who left here in ommand of the scouts, reports to General Fowle that the raiders burned Battle's cotton factory at Rocky Mount, broke in the private houses and stores at Sparta, and robbed the citizens of everything valuable. Horses, mules, wagons, buggies, money, watches, negroes, &c., were carried off by them, and other depredations committed too numerous to mention. At Tarboro' they burnt the jail, the warehouse and the houses occupied by the Quartermaster and Commissary Departments. They were met at a bridge near Sparta, and, after some fighting, were forced to change their route. Their force, including negro soldiers and stolen negroes, was believed to be 2,000. They left in the direction of Snow Hill, and at 11 o'clock on Tuesday were at Mr. Moore's, 11 miles from Sparta.

The Raid on Rocky Mount.

Goldsboed, N. C., July 21, '63. MR. J. L. BENNINGTON.—Dear Sir: I have just seen and conversed with Mr. John Crone, Road Master of the Wilmington and Weldon Rail Road Company, who went up to Rocky Mount to-day, to see the extent of the damage done by the Yankee barbarians in their raid on that place. He reports that they burnt the fine bridge over Tar river, the warehouse, water-tank, woodshed and ticket office of the Railroad Company and three coaches and two box cars, and ruined one engine completely, but did not tear up the track. They burnt Bittle's cotton factory, grist mill, and cotton store, ravaged his two plantations, burning his barns, and took his horses and mules a good many negroes. Anong other sufferers I b

the following: From Kelly Lewis, they took eight likely negroes; from W. W. Parker, they took \$8 000 in money, and two borses and burnt his stable and buggy, besides money in his possession belonging to other parties; from Wn. Pope, they took \$30,000; from Rob't Watson, \$1000 in gold and his wearing pparal, de. John Tillery and others, also suffered havy loss. I understant they camped about three mes from Rocky Mount hat night, and did not seem to ct as if afraid of being mo'ested in their nefarious opeations. The force is said to have been very small. Howlong, Oh how long, are we to be subjected to sucle uthless acts of vandalism. Men of North Carolinal, is time some effort should be made to put a stop to lese raids. No man's property within one hundred iles of their dens at Washington and Newbern is see as long as small parties can roam the country at burn and plunder at will. I hope soon to see som of the rascals caught and made to pay the penalt of their crimes.
