TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

REPORTED FOR THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.

Important Proclamation from President Davis—Amnesty Offered to Deserters, &c.

Washington, Aug. 3.—The President has issued an address to the soldiers of the Confederate States, and reminded them that there is no alternative but victory or annihilation, slavery and utter ruin; and that all that is required to ensure victory is that those who have been called to the field, by every motive that can move the human heart, should promptly repair to the post of duty assigned by their comrades now in front of the foe, and strengthen the armies of the Confederacy as to the advantage. After referring to various causes of abandonment from the army, the President appeals to his countrymen to hasten to their camps in obedience to the duty of honor and duty. He declares general pardon and amnesty to all officers and men, absent without leave, who will, with the least possible delay, return to duty, but amnesty will not be received for delay beyond twenty days after the first publication of this proclamation in the State in which the absentees may be at the date of publication. The amnesty extends to all accused or convicted deserters without leave, or desertion, excepting those who have been twice convicted. The proclamation closes with an appeal to the women of the Confederacy to exert their all-powerful influence in aid of this call.

Additional Note from the North—Raid by Mosby.

Richmond, Aug. 3.—Liverpool letters state that one of the iron-clad vessels was launched a short time since. She is a most formidable-looking craft and will have two masts and a ram projecting seven feet. It is believed this vessel is designed for the rebels. Mosby's men made a raid to Fairfax Court House on Wednesday, capturing a number of sutler's wagons loaded with goods. Osterhaus was not killed as reported. A serious riot occurred recently at Belfast, Ireland, between the Catholics and Protestants. In New York, on Friday, gold was 128 5/8 and firm. The Tribune correspondent gives authoritative confirmation to the report of the Herald relative to a discussion of propositions of peace in the Cabinet at Washington, and says that Chase, Stanton, Welles and Usher are of opinion the slavery should cease in all sections, while Blair, Sewall and Pates claim that the interests of political economy demand that emancipation should be gradual. With the exception of this difference the Cabinet is united.

From Richmond.

Richmond, Aug. 3.—The central train brought news this evening except reports relating to the movements of the army. The loss of the Yankees in the late fight at Brandy Station is represented to have been much heavier than that of the Confederates. This has been a very quiet day in Richmond. The weather continues very hot. Twelve Yankees captured near Dumfries, yesterday, and sent this evening by the Fredericksburg train.

From Charleston.

Charleston, August 3.—Slow firing on both sides was continued yesterday and last night. Our casualties on Morris Island, yesterday, two killed and four wounded. All quiet this morning. The Mercury of Saturday says: At about half past three o'clock yesterday morning the heavy and rapid cannonade in the direction of Morris Island indicate that warm work had recommenced upon the Southern portion of Morris Island opened simultaneous fire. The new circular battery nearest to Battery Wagner, and armed with Parrot guns, which had just been mounted in a Yankee battery below Graham's house, also participated in the bombardment. The enemy's fire was replied to with spirit by Fort Sumter and batteries Wagner, Gregg and Simkins. The fight lasted with great violence until about half past six o'clock, a. m., when the firing became less rapid, and soon subsided into the slow and desultory bombardment to which our community has grown so accustomed. As usual, the Yankee shot and shell made no impression upon the staunch sand fort. Our casualties at Battery Wagner were two killed and five wounded. Up to a late hour last night the mortar firing continued, but at long intervals.
