From Charleston-Sumter Seriously Damaged —The Fight Still Progressing.

CHARLESMON, Aug. 20 .- The firing of the Parrott guns upon Sumter to day was exceedingly heavy, but not so accurate as heretofore. About noon the flag was shot away, but soon replaced. No easualties reported. Col. Alfred Rhett, commanding, and garrison are stout-bearted.

The battery of Parrott guns is distant from Sumter two miles, five eighths. The missles used are 200 pound balls. eight inches in diameter and two teet long, with flat head of chilled iron. Shells of the same dimensions are also used.

Up to Wednesday night, the third day of the attack, nineteen hundred and seventy-two of their missles struck Sumter, and including to-day about twenty-five hundred have struck.

The damage of course, is considerable, and for the last two days all of the guns of the South face have been disabled. Yesterday, about four o'clock, the Ironclads formed in line of battle to renew the attack on Sumter, but the Fort opened at long range from the East face and they retired without attacking. To-day the Ironsides and two Monitors kept up the fire on Wagne. at intervals, and the Yankee's suppers have begun to make approaches on that battery from their nearest work. A shot from Wagner disabled one of the Parrott guns, and the James Island batteries, under Lieut. Col. Yates, explod--d two of the enemy's ammunition obests.

From Virginia -- Northern Items, &c.

RICEBOND, Aug. 20-Several transports, loaded with troops, passed down the Potomac a few days since. Their destination is unknown. No doubt Meade's army has fallen back towards Washington, where it will probably remain until recruited by consoriots.

Marquis Dementholon, recent Consul General from France at New York, sailed for Europe in the Scotis. A deserter from Wagner reports that two thirds of the

Yankee Tyranny at Vicksburg.

JACKSON, Aug. 20 -Federal tyranny at Vicksburg is daily growing more oppressive. Peaceable citizens are arrested and put in jail upon the least suspicion of disloyalty. Some of the more outspoken ones are sent out of the lines, not to return, on pain of being treated as traitors to the United States Government.

THE NEWS FROM THE FORTS AND BATTEBIES-PROGRESS AND RESULTS OF THE BOMBARDMENT .-The firing on Monday night had been slow, but early in the morning the bombardment was renewed with no less fury than was exhibited on the previous day. Three Monitors and the Ironsides assaulted Battery Wagner, throwing at the same time from their position on the other side of Cumming's Point, an occasional shell at Fort Sumter. This continued till ten o'clock, at which hoar the fleet ceased its fire and drew off for a while.

In the meanwhile, the land batteries of the enemy made up of five Parrott and two lighter guns, were directing their shots at Sumter. They opened fire about 6 a. m., and kept pounding away for the remainder of the day. Their fire, however, though heavier, perhaps, by a gun or two, was less continu-ous and less accurate than on Monday, owing, we have it upon unquestionable authority, to the fact that they were much and seriously embarrassed in their operations by our batteries upon James Island.

Between two and three o'clock, P. M., a single. Monitor engaged Fort Wagner, and was driven off in a disabled condition. That obstinate fort is as strong as ever , and the brave officer at present in command, Col. Keitt, declares that he will hold it as long as there is a hillock of sand upon the Island.

There were no casualties in Fort Sumter up to a late hour yesterday afternoon, and up to one o'clock, p. m., none at Fort Wagner.

The firing, of course, slackened at night, about one gun being heard in fifteen minutes .- Charleston Mercury, 19th.
