RICHMOND, Sept 5 .- The Baltimore American of the 3d contains Lincoln's letter to the Springfield mass meeting nfull. It says there are but three conceivable ways to obtain a peace. First. Suppress the rebellion by force of arms. This he is trying to do. The second way is to give up the Union. He is against this, as there only remains some imaginary compromise. I do not believe any compromises embracing the maintenance of the Union now possible. All that I learn leads direct to the opposite belief. A compromise to be effective must be made with those who control the army, or with the people after being liberated from the domination of that army by the access of our army. Now allow me to assure you that no word or intimation from the Rebel army or men. concerning or in relation to peace or compromise has ever came to r.y knowledge, and it is my belief that all charges of an intimation to the contrary is deceptive and groundless, and I promise you if any such propositions bereafter come, it shall not be rejected or kept secret trom you. In regard to negroes Lincoln say that it is quite likely a difference of opinion exists between you and miself on that subject. I certainly wish all men could be two. You, I suppose, do not yet. I have neither adopted or proposed any measure not consistent with even your views, provided you are for the Union. ----THE PLAN FOR PASSING FORT SUMTER-THE NA-VY MUST NOW DO THE WORK.

The New York Heraid contains a four-column letter containing the latest Northern news from Charleston. We extract some portions of it :

It is cortain that no serious offensive powers are left to the rebels in Fort Sumter, and the passage of the fort by our iron-clads is entirely practicable, without much danger from its fire. At all events we have inflicted enough damage upon the fort to justify us in regarding it as practically reduced, and incapable of inflicting serious barm upon a fleet. If the navy cannot now pass the work, we may as well regard that arm of the service as of little value. The long looked for moment will soon arrive when a second attempt to passe it by our iren-clads will be made. The first, on the 7th of April last, by the squadron under Admiral Dupont, although one of brillaint dash, boldness, and vigor, failed for reasons well known to the public. the vessels themselves, several individuals to the contrary notwithstanding. Of this no one who knows the cir cumstances of the case can doubt.

This, the second attempt, is under more favorable circumstances. Sumter is out of the way, or at least so weak as to inspire little fear. Fort Moultrie can be passed at a distance of early, if not quite, a mile, and her fire and that of battery Bee should not be very dangerous to the monitors. Battery Greg, with her single gun, is of little account. What is most to be feared is the obstructions and torpedoes. The enemy have unquestionably been engaged in perfecting their very effective system of obstructions and submarine defences since our occupation of this island, with a view of meeting a contingency now presented by the defenéeless condition of Fort Sumter. Then they have Fort Johnson, the new batteries near it, the Middle Ground battery, and others which I cannot locate, with the rams, upon which they place much reliance. But all this is to be more definitely settled, probably, before this will reach you, and it is useless to indulge in further

speculation on the subject. What Admiral Dahlgren's plans are I do not profess to know; but I have reason to fear that he is loosing most valuable time by his delay. Every moment now is worth a year in ordinary times-a fact which the rebels recognize, as they are strengthening and enlarging their old batteries, building new ones, and mounting heavier guns at points where they will be terribly effective against the navy if it ever attempts to move towards Charleston. A few days more delay may ruin the entire campaign. Sumter was reduced because it was in the way of the navy; but Admiral Dahlgren has as yet made no advance towards completing the work which Gen. Gillmore has so gloriously begun. The army is unable to do more. Gen. Gilmore has performed his part of the contract, and it now remains for the navy to enter upon and perform its part of the work. A week's delay may enable the rebels to replace Fort Sumter by new batteries within the harbor, which will make the capture of Charleston as far off as it was before we fired the first shot against it. There is a deep feeling of fear growing on shore that the fruits of our glorious triump will be permitted to slip from our grasp by inexplicable procrastination on the part of the navy. I cannot explain this seeming want of energy on the part of the naval authorities. They may be able to do it; but some better reasons must be given than those already in circulation, or the country will feel far from satisfied with the results of naval operations in this quarter.

PAID THE PENALTY.—It has already been noticed by telegraph that ten deserters were to be hung for desertion, in presence of Gen. Lee's army on Saturday last. Some of the Richmond papers have them from the 13th N. C. Troops, but the Enquirer, from which we copy the following, puts them down from the 3d. We hope their fate will be a warning to others. The Enquirer of Saturday says:

Ten men, manacled two by two, and escorted by a strong guard from the City Battalion, marched through the streets from Castle Thunder to the Central Depot, yesterday morning, and there took the 6:30 A. M. train for Gordonsville, from which point they were to be forwarded to Orange Court House, to suffer, in the presence of Gen. Edward S. Johnson's command, Ewell's corps, the penalty of death for the dcuble crime of desertion and murder. They are all members of Company H., 3rd N. C. Infantry, and their names are Francis Bunn, James Ellis, W. H. Kelly, R. D. Clarke, John R. Bledsoe, John L. Rainer. John Futch, Henry Pricot, B. Bunn, and Dorsey Plant. It will be remembered that while attempting to arrest them with a squar of men, near Scottsville, Va., Adjutant Mallet was fired upon by them and instantly killed. They will meet their doom to-day " between sunrise and sunset," according to the order of the court martial. As the party entered the cars they appeared hard and careless, but in more than one instance the eyes of several were swimming with tears. Ali were munching their morning ration of bread, which they brought in their hands from the prison, and seemed to partake of it listlessly, as if they cared neither for it nor the life they were

CONFEDERATE MONEY .- It is well that the soldiers who receive \$11 per month for their service, in addition to their hard fare and scanty clothing, do not take the same view of the value of the Confederate money that is held by some of the skulkers and extortioners. If they did their conclusion would be that \$11 per month in Confederate notes, were only equal to twelve dollars per annum in gold, and were they to follow the example of some of the stay at homeites their logic would lead them to suspend fighting until the Government increased their pay. But, we all know that the gallant men who have so nobly sustained our cause have never entertained such a thought. They would seem to do anything so mercenary, unpatriotic, and disgraceful as to "strike for higher pay." They look to the Government to reestablish the value of the currency, and until that is done they will receive what is now but a mere "pittance." What a contrast between the men in the field and thousands not in the field. The former, a band of patriots, the latter, worshippers of Mammon from morning till night .- Rich. Whig

MILITARY NOTICES.

TO THE SOLDIERS OF THE CONFEDE-

FTER MORE THAN TWO YEARS OF A WAR-A fare scarcely equalled in the number, magnitude. and tearful carnage of its battles; a warfare in which your courage and fortitude have illustrated your country, and attracted not only gratitude at home, but admiration abroad ; your enemies continue a struggle in which our final triumph must be inevitable. Unduly elated with their recent successes, they imagine that temporary naverses can quell your spiritor shake your determination, and they are now gathering heavy masses for a general invasion in the vain hope that, by a desperate effort. success may at length be reached.

You know too well, my countrymen, what they mean by success. Their malignant rage aims at nothing less than the extermination of yourselves, your wives, and children. They seek to destroy what they cannot plunder. They propose as the spoils of victory, that your homes shall be partitioned among the wretches whose atrocious cruelties have stamped infamy on their Government. They design to incite servile insurrection and light the fires of incendiarism wherever they can reach your homes, and they debauch the inferior race, hitherto docile and contented, by promising indulgence of the vilest passions, as the price of treachery. Conscious of their inability to prevail by legitimate warfare, not daring to make peace lest they should be hurled from their seats of power, the men who now rule in Washington refuse even to confer on the subject of putting an end to outrages which disgrace our ag ; or to listen to a suggestion for conducting the war according to the usages of civiliza-

Pellow-citizens, no alternative is left you but victory. or subjugation, slavery and the utter ruin of yourselves. your families and your country. The victory is within your reach. You need but stretch forth your hands to grasp it. For this end, all that is necessary is, that those who are called to the field by every motive that can move the human heart, should promptly repair to the post of duty, should stand by their comrades now in front of the foe, and thus so strengthen the armies of the Confederacy as to ensure success. The men now absent from their posts would, if present in the field, suffice to create numerical equality between our force and that of the invaders -and when with any approach of such equality, have we failed to be victorious? I believe that but few of those absent are actuated by unwillingness to serve their country; but that many have found it difficult to resist the temptation of a visit to their homes and the loved ones from whom they have been so long separated; that others have left for temporary attention to their affairs, with the intention of returning, and then have shrunk from the consequences of their violation of duty; that others, again, have left their posts from mere restlessness and desire of change, each quieting the upbraidings of his conscience, by persuading himself that his individual services could have no influence on the general result.

These and other causes (although far less disgraceful than the desire to avoid dangen, or to escape from the sacrifices required by patriotism) are, nevertheless, grievous faults, and place the cause of our beloved country, and of everything we hold dear, in imminent peril. I repeat that the men who now owe duty to their country, who have been called out and have not yet reported for duty, or who have absented themselves from their posts, are sufficient in number, to secure us victory in the strug-

I call on you, then, my countrymen, to hasten to your camps, in obedience to the dictates of honor and duty, and summon those who have absented themselves without leave, or who have remained absent beyond the period allowed by their rurloughs, to repair without delay to their respective commands, and I do hereby declare that I grant a general pardon and amnesty to all officers and men within the Confederacy, now absent without leave, who shall, with the least possible delay, return to their proper posts of duty; but no excuse will be received for any delay beyond enenty days after the first publication of this proclamation in the State in which the absentee may be at the day of the publication. This amnesty and pardon shall extend to all who have been accused, or who have been convicted and are undergoing sentence for absence without leave or desertion, excepting only those

who have been twice convicted of desertion. Finally, I conjure my country women-the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of the Confederacy-to use their all-powerful influence in aid of this call, to add one crowning sacrifice to those which their patriotism has so freely and constantly offered on their country's altar, and to take care that none who owe service in the field shall be sheltered at home from the disgrace of having deserted their duty to their families, to their country, and to their
