THE FIRE-AN ADENDUM .- In consequence of the late hour at which we closed yesterday morning to put to press we were not able to give as minute a statement of the conflagration and its consequences as we desired to place before our readers.

The paragraph already read gave the hour and results of the occurrence, but no other facts.


It appears that the origin of the fire, after weighing very earefully all the circumstances, was purely accidental.

During the prevalence of the fire, and commencing. very early after the alarm was given, the gentlemen engaged in the Navy Department, in its various branches of mechanism, labored faithfully, efficiently and successfully, in subduing the devouring element and preserving property. They are entitled to the thanks of this community.

The Georgia troops that had arrived in Charlotte at 10 o'clock, P. M., as a body also rendered valuable service.

Our colored population who manned the fire engines worked faithfully, and nobly contended to emulate the superior class in their determination to arrest the destruction of property. That is more than the "mud sills of Northern societies" ever engage in with a heart.

The efforts of these three communities-the fire department, the Georgia troops, and the few citizens who did assist-were crowned with great success. Much private property was destroyed and pilfered, but for a proper system, which we, as a people, have not properly matured.

Dear Sir-Your letter of the 8th, with the accompanying note of the same date, was received vester-

The most important paragraph in the letter, as 1 consider, is in these words : "On the 25th of November last I was advised by an authority which I deemed likely to be well informed, as well as reliable and truthful, that the Southern States would send representatives to the next Congress, provided that a full and general annesty should permit them to do so. No guarantee or terms were asked for other than the amnesty referred to."

I strongly suspect your information will prove to be groundless ; nevertheless, I thank you for communicating it to me. Understanding the phrase in the paragraph above quoted-"the Southern States would send representatives to the next Congress"-to be substantially the same as that "the people of the Southern States would cease resistance, and would reinaugurate, submit to, and sustain the national authority within the limits of such States, under the Constitution of the United States." I say that in such case the war would cease on the part of the United States; and that if within a reasonable time "a full and general amnesty" were necessary to such end, it would not be withheld.

f do not think it would be proper now to gammunicate this, formally or informally, to the people of the Southern States. My belief is that they already know it; and when they choose, if ever, they can communicate with me unequivocally. Nor do I think it proper now to suspend military operations to try and experiment of negotiation.

I should, nevertheless, receive with great pleasure the exact information you now have and also such other as you in any way may obtain. Such information might be more valuable before the 1st of January than afterward. While there is nothing in this letter which I shall dread to see in history, it is perhaps better for the present that its existence should not become public. I therefore have to request that you will regard it as confidential. Your obedient servant,

MILITARY NOTICES.

TO THE SOLDIERS OF THE CONFEDE-RATE STATES.

A FTER MORE THAN TWO YEARS OF A WAR-fare scarcely equalled in the number, magnitude, and fearful carnage of its battles; a warfare in which your courage and fortitude have illustrated your country, and attracted not only gratitude at home, but admiration abroad ; your enemies continue a struggle in which our final triumph must be inevitable. Unduly elated with their recent successes, they imagine that temporary reverses can quell your spirit or shake your determination, and they are now gathering heavy masses for a gen-eral invasion in the vaih hope that, by a desperate effort, success may at length be reached.

You know too well, my countrymen, what they mean v success. Their malignant rage aims at nothing less han the extermination of yourselves, your wives, and children. They seek to destroy what they cannot plunder. They propose as the spoils of victory, that your homes shall be partitioned among the wretches whose atrocious cruelties have stamped infamy on their Government. They design to incite servile insurrection and light the tires of incendiarism wherever they can reach your homes, and they debauch the inferior race, hitherto docile and contented, by promising indulgence of the vilest passions, as the price of treachery. Conscious of their inability to prevail by legitimate warfare, not daring to make peace lest they should be hurled from their seats of power, the men who now rule in Washington refuse even to confer on the subject of putting an end to outrages which disgrace our age, or to listen to a suggestion for conducting the war according to the usages of civilization.

Fellow-citizens, no alternative is left you but victory, or subjugation, slavery and the utter ruin of yourselves, your families and your country. The victory is within your reach. You need but stretch forth your hands to grasp it. For this end, all that is necessary is, that those who are called to the field by every motive that can move the human heart, should promptly repair to the post of duty, should stand by their comrades now in front of the foe, and thus so strengthen the armies of the Confederacy as to ensure success. The men now absent from their posts would, if present in the field, suffice to create numerical equality between our force and that of the invaders -and when with any approach of such equality, have we failed to be victorious? I believe that but few of those absent are actuated by unwillingness to serve their country; but that many have found it difficult to resist the temptation of a visit to their homes and the loved ones from whom they have been so long separated; that others have left for temporary attention to their affairs, with the intention of returning, and then have shrunk from the consequences of their violation of duty ; that others, again, have left their posts from mere restlessness and desire of change, each quieting the upbraidings of his conscience, by persuading himself that his individual services could have no influence on the general result. These and other causes (although far less disgraceful than the desire to avoid dangen, or to escape from the sacrifices required by patriotism) are, nevertheless, grievous faults, and place the cause of our beloved country, and of everything we hold dear, in imminent peril. I repeat that the men who now owe duty to their country, who have been called out and have not yet reported for duty, or who have absented themselves from their posts, are sufficient in number, to secure us victory in the struggle now impending. I call on you, then, my countrymen, to hasten to your camps, in obedience to the dictates of honor and duty, and summon those who have absented themselves without leave, or who have remained absent beyond the period allowed by their rurloughs, to repair without delay to their respective commands, and I do hereby declare that I grant a general pardon and amnesty to all officers and men within the Confederacy, now absent without leave, who shall, with the least possible delay, return to their proper posts of duty; but no excuse will be received for any delay beyond twenty days after the first publication of this proclamation in the State in which the absentee may be at the date of the publication. This amnesty and pardon shall extend to all who have been accused, or who have been convicted and are undergoing sentence for absence without leave or desertion, excepting only those who have been twice convicted of desertion. Finally, I conjure my countrywomen-the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of the Confederacy-to use their all-powerful influence in aid of this call, to add one crowning sacrifice to those which their patriotism has so freely and constantly offered on their country's altar, and to take care that none who owe service in the field shall be sheltered at home from the disgrace of having deserted their duty to their families, to their country, and to their God. But Mr. Moore's loss will not fall short of twenty-five thousand dollars, upon which there is no insurance; but Moore has much, if not more left, and will do his best to accommodate his friends and patrons.

The proprietor of the Mansion House, Mr. Wm. Treloar, has sustained a large loss in the destruction of the property named, upon which he has an insurance of only about nine thousand dollars. He cannot replace the buildings and make good his contract with Mr. Moore for a less sum than thirty-three thousand dollars.

Scences were enacted at the close of the fire which should not have occurred. Some of the sufferers were most badly treated and some of our best citizens were assaulted by drunken men, who, because they were not supplied with liquor, attempted, to murder as a revenge. The actors in this scene were not North Carolinians nor were they South Carolinians.

No. 3. I. The Commanding Officers of Battalions of Home Guards are charged with the apprehension of deserters

and recusant conscripts in their respective counties. For this purpose they will call out for local and temporary service, such portions of their Battalions as they may deem necessary. The Deserters and Conscripts will be taken to the nearest Conscript Camp. The Commanding Officers of North Carolina Militia will

continue to comply with General Order, No. 5, dated May 1863, until the Home Guards are fully organized in their respective Counties.

II. Boards for Examination of persons claiming exemption from Home Guard duty, because of physical disabil ity, will immediately visit all the Counties in which the "Home Guards" have been or may hereafter be organ-

The following classes of persons will be ezamined : 1st, All who have been exempted previous to the 15th of July, 1863.

2d, All who have been examined subsequent to the 1st September, 1863.

3d, All who may be presented by the Surgeon, or commander of the Regiment, or Battalion of Home Guards, to which the individual belongs.

The decisions of the Boards will be final, except that appeals may be taken to the Surgeon General, with the consent of the Examining Board.

After a visit has been made to a County by an examining Board, the commander of its Home Guards will not recognize the validity of exemptions issued from this oftice previous to the 15th of July, or subsequent to 1-t

September, 1863 unless approved by the Board. Due notice will be given by the senior member of the Board to the Commander of the Battalion of an intended visit, in order that those having certificates, or desirous of being examined, may have an opportunity of appearing before the Board.
