

## TO THE SOLDIERS OF THE CONFEDE-RATE STATES.

FTER MORE THAN TWO YEARS OF A WAR-A fare scarcely equalled in the number, magnitude. and fearful carnage of its battles; a warfare in which your courage and fortitude have illustrated your country, and attracted not only gratitude at home, but admiration abroad ; your enemies continue a struggle in which our final triumph must be inevitable. Unduly elated with their recent successes, they imagine that temporary reverses can quell your spirit or shake your determination, and they are now gathering heavy masses for a general invasion in the vain hope that, by a desperate effort, success may at length be reached. You know too well, my countrymen, what they mean

by success. Their malignant rage aims at nothing less than the extermination of yourselves, your wives, and children. They seek to destroy what they cannot plunder. They propose as the spoils of victory, that your homes shall be partitioned among the wretches whose attocious cruelties have stamped infamy on their Government. They design to incite servile insurrection and light the fires of incendiarism wherever they can reach your homes, and they debauch the inferior race, hitherto docile and contented, by promising indulgence of the vilest passions, as the price of treachery. Conscious of their inability to prevail by legitimate warfare, not daring to make peace lest they should be hurled from their seats of power, the men who now rule in Washington refuse even to confer on the subject of putting an end to outrages which disgrace our age, or to listen to a suggestion for conducting the war according to the usages of civilization.

Fellow-citizens, no alternative is left you but victory, or subjugation, slavery and the utter ruin of yourselves. your families and your connery. The victory is within your reach. You need but stretch forth your hands to grasp it. For this end, all that is necessary is, that those who are called to the field by every motive that can move the human heart, should promptly repair to the post of duty, should stand by their comrades now in front of the foe, and thus so strengthen the armies of the Confederacy as to ensure success. The men now absent from their posts would, if present in the field, suffice to create numerical equality between our force and that of the invaders -and when with any approach of such equality, have we failed to be victorious? I believe that but few of those absent are actuated by unwillingness to serve their country; but that many have found it difficult to resist the ptation of a visit to their homes and th

Sunday, General Stuart lost two pieces of borse artillery The enemy has advanced to the Rapidan, and skirmishing was going on all day ve-terday between cavalry and sharpshooters. It is thought that a general engagement will occur near Orange Court House to-day.

[SHOWND DISPATCH.] RICEMOND, Sept. 15 .- All quiet on the Rapidan to-day. Prospect of an engagement diminished. We lost but twenty-three killed and wounded in the artillery duel at Raccoon Ford.

#### From Charleston.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 13 .- All has been very quiet for two days past. The enemy has made no new movements of late. Three of the Monitors have gone off, nobody knows whither.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 14 .- The enemy is perfecting his arrangements for a permanent occupation of Morris Island. and has erected a telegraph along the whole length of the Island, and is converting Battery Wagner into a powerful work, enlarging the bomb-proofs, etc. The Yankees fire occasionally from Battery Gregg on boats plying in the harbor. A Yankee reconneitering party, including a Chaplain, Lieutenant, telegraph operator and a negro seldier, were captured Saturday on the Sayannah Railroad, below this city. They had tapped our wires, endeavoring to obtain information, but got none. Slow firing continues this morning, mostly from our batteries.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 14 .- There is nothing to vary the monotony here to-day. Very little firing. Some anxiety to hear from Bragg.

CHARLESTON, Fept. 15 .- Weather here is variable, and the equinoctial gale is daily expected. The enemy is building a telegraph line from Tybee Island, and Fort Pulaski, along the Carolina coast, to Cummings' Point. Our batteries continue to annoy the enemy occasionally. No other firing heard.

#### From Georgia-Skirmishing with the Enemy -Railroad Accident, &c.

ATLANTA, Sept. 14 .- Advices from the front state that Gen. Bushrod Johnson and Gen. Forrest were skirmishing with the enemy near Dalton, on Friday. Gen. Forrest was slightly wounded, but is still in the saddle. The Tankees advance was at Tunnel Hill Friday night. Our forces are concentrating to meet them. It is reported that Gen. Wheeler had a skirmish near Lafayette on Friday, but the energy being too strong, Wheeler fell back. On Saturday Buckner took three hundred prisoners at McLemore's Gap. A general engagement is thought imminent.

A collision occurred on the W. & A. R. R. Sunday, near Altona. About thirty persens killed and wounded, principally soldiers.

#### Railroad Accident.

MARIETTA, Sept. 14 .- The trains from Atlanta yesterday morning ran off the track two miles above here. No damage was done, but the trains were delayed, and running out of schedule time, collided with a special train last evening, near Etowah, killing some fifteen soldiers and wounding forty. The passenger train from Atlanta fbis morning is delayed here.

from whom they have been so long separated : that others have left for temporary attention to their affairs, with the intention of returning, and then have shrunk from the consequences of their violation of duty ; that others, again, have left their posts from mers restlessness and desire of change, each quieting the apbraidings of his conscience, by persuading himself that his individual ser-

vices could have no influence on the general result. These and other causes (although far less disgraceful than the desire to avoid danger, or to escape from the sacrifices required by patriotism) are, nevertheless, grievous faults, and place the cause of our beloved country, and of everything we hold dear, in imminent peril. I repeat that the men who now owe duty to their country. who have been called out and have not yet reported for duty, or who have absented themselves from their posts, are sufficient in number, to secure us victory in the struggle now impending.

I call on you, then, my countrymen, to hasten to your camps, in obedience to the dictates of honor and duty. and summon those who have absented themselves without leave, or who have remained absent beyond the peried allowed by their mrloughs, to repair without delay to their respective commands, and I do hereby declare that I grant a general pardon and amnesty to all officers and men within the Confederacy, now absent without leave, who shall, with the least possible delay, return to their proper posts of duty ; but no excuse will be received for any delay beyond twenty days after the first publication of this proclamation in the State in which the absentee may be at the date of the publication. This amnesty and pardon shall extend to all who have been accused, or who have been convicted and are undergoing sentence for absence without leave or desertion, excepting only those who have been twice convicted of desertion.

Finally, I conjure my countrywomen-the wives, mothrs, sisters and daughters of the Confederacy-to use their all-powerful influence in aid of this call, to add one crowning sacrifice to those which their patriotism has so freey and constantly offered on their country's altar, and to take care that none who owe service in the field shall be heitered at home from the disgrace of having deserted their duty to their families, to their country, and to their God.

Given under my hand, and the Seal of the -n-Confederate States, at Richmond, this 1st day SEAL. of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand, eight hundred and sixty-three.
