FROM TEXAS.

Through the politeness of A. S. Rose, Esq. of Houston, fexas, the Enquirer has been placed in possession of a fle of Texas papers. Mr. Bose brings from his native State \$146,000 for soldiers now in service in this and other States. He also brings 2,600 letters from the relatives of the Texas soldiers. potatoes during the winter, in Hanover Co., Va., adopt

In a bigh, dry spot, excavate a hole of convenient size and shape, to the depth of four or five feet Put in a layer of pine tags, say three inches thick, the sides also should be lined with the same as the potatoes are put in. After the hole is filled to within one foot of the surface, and a shelter to keep off the rain erected, the potatoes are allowed to remain untouched for about a week, to undergo what is called the sweat. Then pine tags are thrown into the hole even with the surface, and plank laid over. It is of the greatest importance that no water should run in upon the potatoes, and they should not be moved or touched until taken out for use. Pine tags the best nonconductor, universally used in Hanover. The usual country shelter is made of top fodder and corn stalks.
