

It is the soul of enlightened manhood which, although it may be cowed in individuals, can never be conquered in a people. It may fail in ag-gressive, but nover in defensive warfare. Where the issue is some question that affects only the dignity or interest of a nation, it may yield its point to physical superiority; when it is aroused to the vindication of the principle of political existence, it is indomitable. No enlightened people, educated to freedom, have ever been ssentially subdued. Their territory may have been overrun, their armies destroyed and their capitals occuied by invaders, but they have always preserved the spirit of national independence which, however shackled, awaits the hour o its redemption.

If our statesmen would but give their intellects some respite from preoccupation upon the military situation, they might appreciate how futile must be the attempt to subjugate the will of such a people. What signifies the conquest of their territory if the spirit of repugnance to political companionship with the North is unrestrained? We have to conquer physical resistance, which has thus far defied our uticost efforts; and which, being conquered, will give us but so many disaffected provinces to be controlled by military agencies. to the destruction of our republican institutions. We have uiged a suspension of hostilities, chiefly because we are assured that statesmanship is paralyzed by civil strife and fails to consider the solution of the political problem. Let reason have its opportunity, and there is heart and brain enough in either section to hear its counsels and abide by its decisions.

THE FIGHT AT LEWISBURG .- The Lynchburg Republican, of the 9th, savs: > /

Authentic reports were received here Saturday, that a bloody battle was fought Friday, near Lewisburg, in Greenbrier county, between the Yankee General Averili. with 7,000 men, and General Echols, commanding the Confederates, with about 2,000. The great disparity of numbers between the opposing forces made it necessary for General Echols to ret: eat, after a light of two hours. in which he is reported to have lost very heavily in killed and wounded. We have no particulars of casualties. It was stated Saturday night by passengers on the Western train, that our troops were retreating in the direction of Salem, sixty miles west of this city, on the Vir ginia and Tennessee Railroad, and that they were being closely pursued by the enemy, who, it was feared, unleschecked, would succeed in reaching the railroad.





Further correspondence between Ould and Meredith relative to the exchange of prisouers is published. Meredith replies at ength, and charges that a system of exchanges was first first interrupted by the Confederate Government in deelaring its purpose to make certain distinctions in the treatment of a particular class of troops. He refers also to the charges that Onld improperly declared exchanged a large portion of the troops captured and paroled by Grant, and having thus exhausted paroled prisoners in his hands, he proposes delivering prisoners in our (Tan- . kee) hands for whom there are no equivalents, or comparatively few.

The proposal, therefore, not accepted. Ould, on the 31st, exposes the falsity of the various statements of the Yankee Commissioner, and robukes his malignant and wanton aspersion of the motives of the Confederate authorities in making the proposal contained in the letter of the 20th. He says in conclusion, let me tell you the purpose of your latter is apparent. It has been well known for a long time that your authorities are opposed to a fair and regular exchange of prisoners under the cartel, and in rejecting my proposition you have endeavored to conceal, under closed vague charges and unfounded statements of the determination at which your govcriment long since arrived. Why not be frank once? Why not say without further subterfuge that you have reached conclusions that our officers and soldiers are more valuable, man for man, than yours ?


