Congressional.

RICHMOND, Dec. 21.—Congress is getting ready most important work and the proceedings after this week will be of the highest importance.

The Chairman of the Committee on Military Affairs preservice to day a bill to continue in service to the od of the war all soldiers now in service, or who shall be reafter enter the same, and shall remain in their existing organizations. This bill is not a committee report but presented for the consideration of the House and at the request of the author was referred to his commit-

Another member presented a resolution that if any part of the army be reconscribed it shall be allowed to rlect company and regimental officers. Some debate ensued. Several other propositions were presented and all re-

The Military Committee reported a bill which provides that when a substitute has deserted, or shall hereafter desert, when at the time of reception untit, or when he becomes liable to our diment under present or future laws, the principal shall go into the army. This bill will be considered in order. A number of persons in this city having substitutes have employed counsul to test the legality of any act of Congress which may attempt to place them in service. The sentiment of Congress is divided on the sabject. Some are of the opinion that better to do nothing as those who have substitutes will ail become liable at the end of three years from the time of putting them in the army. The impressment bill reported by the Judiciary Committee a few days ago was taken up and several amendments adopted. The most important allows appeal of both parties when dissatisfied at award of ocal apprisers to State Commissioners. Prohibits the impressment of field negroes, except at order of General Commanding Department. The bill passed.

A bill also passed allowing farmers to commute tenth of sweet potatoes by paving value in money at rates to be fixed by impressment commissioners.

A bill to provide for wounded and disabled soldiers was postponed for special order Monday next. The Senate passed a belt to protect members of Congress from the annoyance of passport agents.

Yet how were his laurels and glories forgotton, while he gazed on the wasted-form - of his venerable parent, from whom he must soon part to meet no more on earth!

The matron's prediction was true. The disease which had for so long a time preyed upon her frame, som completed its triumph, and she expired at the age of cigry-five, confiling in the promise of immortality to the humble believer.

What is to be done? Our armies must be fed with meat at all hazards, whether our people are or not.
