RICHMORD, May 7 - The following dispatch was received at the War Department this morning : HEADQUARTERS ABOUT NORTHERN VIRGINIA, May 7. - To

the Secretary of War: Early this morning as the divis-ions of Gen. Hill's corps engaged yesterday were being relieved, the enemy advanced and created some confusion. The ground lost was recovered as soon as fresh troops gos into position and the chemy driven back to his original Afterpards we turned the left of his fresh line and dreve it from the field, leaving a large number of dead and wounded in our bands, among them Gen. Wadsworth. A subsequent attack forced the enemy into his entrenched lines on the Brook Road, extending from Wilderness Tavern, on the right, to Twigg's Mill, Every advance on his part, thanks to a merciful God, has been repulsed. Our loss in killed is not large but we have many wounded, most of them slightly, artillery being littie used on either -ide.

I am griered to announce that Lt. Gen. Longstreet is severely wounded. Gen. Jenkins was killed and Gen-Pegram oadly wounded yesterday. Gen. Stafford, it is hoped, will reporter.

From Northern Virginia. CHANGE C. R., May & .- The attack by the enemy this morning was very violent, but was repulsed in every instance. A strong effort was made to turn our right. We drove them on our left, but he was stubborn on the right, but Longstreet finally forced them to give way. Longstreet received a severe wound in the shoulder. General Paul Jennings was mortally wounded. The fighting was principally with musketry, as the ground is unsuitable for atillery.

THE EVACUATION OF WASHINGTON-PART OF THE TOWN BURNT.

The Wilmington Journal contains the following particulars of the evacuation of the town of Washington:

"Parties who visited Washington since the evacuation of that place by the enemy at noon no Sunday the 1st inst., state that the Yankees signalized their departure by a characteristic act of vandalism, setting fire to the town not far from its centre, or speaking more definitely, at or in the neighborhood of the building formerly occupied by the Bank of Washington. From that point the fire extended Westward nearly up to the bridge, destroying almost every building from the water to the backpart of the town. The fire was prevented from extending eastward by the exertions of the citizens. Mr. Havens' warehouse, containing a considerable quantity of commissary stores, sunit arms, powder, &c., escaped the conflagration, and the contents fell into the hands of the Confederates. The town is now occupied by our forces. On Monday last a gunboat came up the Pamlico, near to the town, and threw one shell into it. We should have stated before, that the bridge over the Pamlico or Tar River was set on fire in three places, and considerably injured, although not destroyed.

"We hear of a few persons who left with the Yankees when they evacuated the town amongst the ournber, Howard Wiswall and family, — Richardson and family, John Prime and family, Col. Sam'l Carrow, Lt. Col. Thomas Brown, U. Rich, Geo. Dixon and several others, names not recollected. Carrow was Militia Colonel of the county, and we do not know that any body also had been appointed. He resided about two miles outside of the enemy's fines, and had been getting cotton for the Yankees, which for illicit trading, our troops were after him .-Thos. Bowen had been Lieut, Colonel of the militia, but his last occupation in Washington is said to have

been clerking for a negro.
"This act of the Yankers fornishes a striking commentary upon Federal occupation. For long months running into years, their forces have held Washington, and yet on leaving it they do their best to destroy it and ruin its inhabitants, regarding them, and no doubt truly, as a hostile people, as indeed is shown by the small-ness of the number of those who have gone off with them. Bunning away from a town, which they dare not hold as warriors, they seek to destroy it as incen-diaries. After having lived among a people for a long stretch of time, on leaving they show their magnanimity by outrages upon the property of the de-fenceless and unarmed, while fleeing from the ap-proaching onset of armed men. It adds one more record of this war, upon which torian will inscribe the damning evidence of Yankee atrocity and barbarism.
