PETERSBURG, July 6 -The Chronicle of the 3d contains a special dispatch from Kennesaw Mountain of the 27th. which says a severe attack was made this morning by sclected portions of the 4th, 2d and Logan's corps, on the enemy's centre, right and left. The fight 'ssted for two hours, but our men were compelled to fall back before the severe fire of the enemy. G. n. Hooker was killed and Gen. McCook was wounded. Our loss 2000, but we now hold a position considerably in advance of where the fighting took place.

### [From the Augusta Chronicle and Sentinel.] FROM THE LEFT OF OUR LINES.

On Friday, Schofield's corps, consisting of about three regiments of cavalry, and ten th usand infantry, advanced on our left, with the intention probably of driving it back, and flauking our main army, and at the same time getting possession of the Turner Ferry road. They, however, were defeated in their plans. The State Proops, assisted by several thousand regular infantry and cavalry, succeeded in keeping them in check. Our less was about one hundred killed and wounded. The enemy's loss was quite heavy.

On Saterday morning our troops withdrew about three miles in good order to a high range of hills about two miles beyond the Chattahoochee. These bills have been well-fortified by breast works and rifle pits. They can only be attacked by the main road, which is very narrow. as nearly the whole country is uncultivated .-The trees on the hill sides have all been cut down, and lie in one tangled mass, making it impossible for the enemy to make a charge except by the narrow passage way spoken of above

On Saturday afternoon the Yankees burned the Sweet Water Cotton Mills and Ferguson's terist and Flouring Mills, in Campbell county, besides the dwellings along the road by which they advanced in that section. Their progress could be distinguished by the columns of rising smoke as the hap, y home of some family was distroyed by the names.

About four o'clock on Saturday their advance lines were checked by our pickets. What further movements have taken place since that we know not as we left for Atlanta at that time.

Our troops appear to be in the last of spirits, and have every confidence in their commanders. The State militia-the much abused portion of our defenders-it is said stood well on Friday and fought as oravely and cool as the regulars.
