But there are good men, young and inexperienced -there are lovers of their country, led astray by the e thusiasm of their nature—there are patriots, acting in good faith and awayed by noble inspirations, but caned away by an overzanlous desire of serving their country, and to these when, through want of consideration, they embark in dangerous and utopian projects, we may address a word of counsel with the hope of being heard.
