RUFUS BARRINGER, COMMANDING Brigade of Cavalry, Army Northern Virginia, is bereby authorized to take possession of all cavalry, arms, equipments and accouraments in the hands of civilians or other unauthorized persons in the State of North Carolina, when he is satisfied that such arms, &c., are legitimately the property of the Confederate States. All arms, &c., dropped by our troops or the enemy on their lines of march, or on battle fields, or left or sold by officers or privates to persons not in the military service, are the property of the Confederate States. No person in the militarys ervice has a right to sell or otherwise dispose of arms &c., except when under the orders and regulations of the

Ac., except when under the orders and regulations of the Ordnance Department.

Gen. Barringer will not delegate this authority to any one except commissioned officers of his own command, who will be furnished with a copy of this authority, and

with instructions to furnish receipts to parties from whom arms, &c., are taken under its provisions.

In such cases (no special aggravation appearing) they may be saved by a prompt return to duty. If arressed, they cannot but expect the death penalty so recently inflicted on two of their comrades in this Brigade.
