LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS.

SENATE.

MORNING, Dec. 12, 1864.

Prayer by Rev. Dr. Mason. Then Mr. Patterson took the Chair.

The Committee on Cherokee Lands reported a substitute for a bill in relation to Cherokee Lands and the Western Turnpike.

A military report was presented from the Committee on Military Affairs opposing giving the Governor authority to send Home Guards out of the State. Ordered to be printed.

The Joint Select Committee on the subject of Impressions by the general government, reported back the whole matter and asked to be discharged. Discharged accordingly.

The Joint Select Committee, to which was referred the bill in regard to the employment in the field of persons assigned to light duty, reported back the same and so concluded its session.

A proposition was sent to the House to go into an election for seven Councillors of State on Thursday next at 12 o'clock.

BILL'S, ETC., APPROVED.

Mr. Odum, a resolution requesting the Governor, in a certain contingency, to remove the appointing State Committee, who has been appointed by him.

Mr. Matthews a bill to incorporate Blacksburg Lodge of Masons.

Mr. Odum, a bill concerning Impoundments, Judiciary.

Mr. Winstead, a resolution in favor of Robert W. Williams.

Mr. Ward, a resolution requiring the Judiciary Committee to inquire whether the Governor can be impeached when the General Assembly is not in session.

Mr. Straughn, a bill to increase the capital stock of the Sapona Iron Works Corporation.

MATTERS FROM THE HOUSE.

A message proposing to raise a Joint Select Committee to enquire into the unfinished business of the two Houses and report when they could adjourn. Considered and Messrs. Courts and Lasalle appointed Senate branch of said Committee.

The House returned Senate's bill fixing the age of members, with an amendment striking out member \$30 per day, instead of \$20. The amendment was carried.

Several unprinted bills and resolutions were received from the House and read the first time.

A bill in reference to the Public Treasurers, under a suspension of the rules, passed its 2d and 3d readings. It provides for the issue of Treasury notes in case of State bonds, as the Treasurer may think best, amount not exceeding three millions of dollars, the Treasury notes to be made payable Jan. 1, 1865.]

A message was concurred in to raise a Joint Select Committee for the re-assignment rooms in the Capitol. Adjourned.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

MONDAY, Dec. 12, 1864.

The House was called to order at 10 o'clock A. M. The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

Mr. Dargan introduced a resolution to discharge further military service Home Guards and other services assigned to light duty, which passed its first reading.

A motion of Mr. Dargan the rules were suspended and the motion was put on its second reading.

Mr. Fowle opposed the resolution as being of no practical importance, and further as being an act of nullification, since the Constitution gave the Legislature no right to interfere with the Senior Reserves. The Judge of our Courts had decided that we have no jurisdiction in the premises.

On motion of Mr. Fowle the resolution was laid on the table.

Mr. Waugh introduced a resolution proposing that from Tuesday next to the close of the session the House shall meet daily at 10 o'clock, a. m.; at 1.15 p. m.; meet again at 7 p. m., and adjourn at 10; p. m. Lieu over under rule.

On motion of Mr. Waugh a message was sent to the Senate proposing to raise a Joint Select Committee on adjournment; also a message proposing adjournment at 12 o'clock, M., on Wednesday next, Councils of State, introduction of bills.

Mr. Russell, a bill to secure the State Salt Works from interruption.

Mr. Carter, a bill respecting the qualification of Justices of the Peace with the enemy's lines.

Mr. McGehee, a bill authorizing the Justices of Caswell county to increase the fees of the gaoler of said county.

Mr. Shepherd, a resolution authorizing the Public Treasurer to receive partial payments of taxes due from counties within the lines of the enemy.

Mr. Shepherd a bill to incorporate the Cumberland Mountain Association.

Mr. Weigh, a bill to amend section 7, chapter 74, of the Revised Code.

Mr. Sharp, a resolution relative to the exemption from military service of employees in Woolen and Cotton Factories.

Mr. Gudger, a bill to incorporate Mt. Herman Lodge, No. 118, Ancient York Masons.

Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg; a bill to amend the 10th chapter of the Revised Code.

An unprinted bill, from the Senate, concerning the mileage and per diem of the members of the General Assembly, was put on its 2d reading.

Mr. Calloway moved to amend by striking out "forty-five dollars per diem" and substituting "sixty." Not agreed to.

Mr. Cobb moved to strike out forty-five and insert forty. Not agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Dargan, the bill was amended by substituting fifty dollars per diem.

The bill then passed its 2d and 3d readings.

The House resumed the consideration of the unfinished business of Friday last, viz: Mr. Fowle's resolution in relation to the suspension of the privilege of the writ *ad eundem corpus*.

Mr. J. H. Headen being entitled to the floor, concluded his remarks in support of the resolutions.

Mr. Cobb opposed the resolutions. He regarded them as useless and mischievous, and deprecated their introduction, calculating to encourage the enemy. He justified the suspension of the *ad eundem corpus*, a necessary war measure, and while he did not believe that the proposed suspension was particularly levelled at North Carolina, he quoted the Governor's message to show that treason existed in this State.

The resolutions were then adopted—*aye* 63, *nay* 29.

Those who voted in the negative were Messrs. Austin, Bond of Madison, Caho, Cobb, Crawford of Rowan, Fallon, Farmer, Grier, Harris, Hawes, Judkins, Love, Outerbridge, Powell, Shepherd, Smith of Duplin, Stanfill, Strong and Wooten 20.

Mr. Boyd, of Rockingham, introduced the following resolutions:

Whereas, This Legislature has heard with satisfaction of the good conduct of the Junior Reserves who volunteered to cross the State line into Virginia in order to repel the late advance of the public enemy on Weldon; Therefore,

Resolved, That the officers and soldiers of the Junior Reserves so acting deserve the commendation of their fellow citizens and are entitled to the thanks of the Legislature.

Resolved, That a copy of these proceedings be transmitted to Lieut. Gen. Holmes, that they may be communicated to the command which they are intended to honor.

These resolutions were adopted having first been amended on motion of Mr. Horton, of Wilkes, by extending their purview to such of the Home Guards as had volunteered to cross the State line, &c.

A bill to legalize certain acts of the county court of Madison county; a resolution in favor of P. M. Ray, Tax Collector of Madison county; a bill to amend an act authorizing the Roanoke Navigation Company to disseminate the use of their canal and the Grand Falls of Roanoke River; the exercise of water-power, etc.; a bill for the support of the N. C. Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, etc., etc.

A bill authorizing the sale of lands in the town of Weaverville, a bill to amend the charter of the Merchant Bank of New Bern; a bill to incorporate the W. R. Day, etc., American, A. M. Morris, etc. It incorporates the trustees of La Pine High School; a bill to provide for the holding of courts in Bertie's county; a bill to incorporate the Hickory Nut Turnpike Road; a resolution in favor of Joseph W. Steel, late Sheriff of Buncombe, to hold a vice-appraisal; a bill to incorporate the Hickory Nut Turnpike Lodge, No. 135, A. Y. M., and a bill to amend an act authorizing the appointment of flour inspectors for the town of Fayetteville.

A bill for the relief of wives and families of soldiers in the army also passed its 2d reading, the amendments proposed by the committee having been first adopted.

The chief of these was an increase of the appropriation from two to three millions of dollars, and the striking out of the proviso which required that the appropriation be used in State debts only.

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
