From the Camden Journal.

FORTY-EIGHT HOURS IN A TREE TOP

My plantation is about three miles from Camden, Wateroe. Intelligence reached me or Westnesday last that the river was rapidly rising I took a bateau, in company with a strong man acreant and pushed on to rescue my stock. While engaged in miture time fine longs, the head dam on the plantatten a love broke, and let loose a flood that awept everythicg before it, and spread out about two miles on mark to bank. In attempting to get out, one har an washed by the current against a tree, capeized and two piged owned. The boat was caught by the tree in midstap, and we managed to get on the losttom where we stood, three feet in water. Our freil anchor bogan to give way, but there was mother tree too feet distant beyond our reach from the boat By crawling as far as we could, and then placing one end of the heat pole in a fork of the tree and nolding the other end, my companion in distress made his ce ape, and in turn held the pole for me. It was a cotton tree, seven inches at the root, and shout forty We had scarcely perched outs lives in the fact high. boughs before me first tree and the boat were swept away. Here we were up a slender tree, with an angry terrent twenty feet deep sweeping five test beneath us, and an expanse of the river more than a mile on either side. From this time, Wednesday twelve o'clock, until Friday two o'clock, we clung for life to these feed but faithful limbs ". e river reached its highest on Wednesday evening at five o'clock, and its roor and width prevented our cries ir in being heard notil next day. All the first slay and night, and all the second day and night, we should for help; and we began to give up all hope. In my exertion to save the heat, I had tot we off a eat, which we lost, and the only way we kept on were from freezing to death, was by vinent's and astantly striking each other and kicking the tree.

About two o'clock on Friday, Mr. Rush, the overseer on Colom Chesnut's plantation, with two colored mon, reacted the tree in a beat. My sol retrey is contined to bed, but is doing well; ne would have given out in a few hours longer no bould. I am serein my limbs, and hourse, but soffer is ut other way, and with gratitude to a kind Providence for rescuing us from a watery grave, I will sver remember the freshet of January 11, 1865.
