TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.]

From Charlotte. CHARLOTTE, Feb. 24. - No alarm in Charlotte. The enemy are reported moving in the direction of Camden, Cherax and Fayetteville.

During the retreat from Columbia, a train of cattle filled with ladies broke down. The enemy threatened their capture, when Hampton, with his cavalry, threw himself in front, promising to defend them with the life of every man of his command.

It is reported that the Western portion of Columbia has been burnt, and that the cotton in stores there is in a state of confusion.

Persons are preparing to evacuate Columbia. CHARLOTTE, Feb. 25. - No additional news from the front. It is still supposed the enemy are making their way north by Cherax and Fayetteville.

CHARLOTTE, Feb. 26. - The following order was published this morning: (General Order No. 1.) In obedience to the orders of the General-in-Chief, the undersigned assumes command of the army of Tennessee and all the troops in the Departments of South Carolina, Georgia and Florida.

He assures his comrades of that army who are still with their comrades that his confidence in their discipline and valor which has heretofore expressed is undiminished.

From Georgia, Mississippi, Alabama, &c. CHARLOTTE, Feb. 24. - The following is the substance of the Southern Express Company's Augusta papers of the 20th.

No important military news from the front. Capt. Dickson, captured several officers and men during a late raid.

Forest has been placed in command of all the cavalry in the Districts of Mississippi, East Louisiana and West Tennessee.

There are many complaints of Kirby Smith in the West. Reorganization in Georgia has already commenced.

A large body of troops are moving in the West and impeding the communication between the States. The Legislature in Mississippi has adjourned.

The message of the Governor of Georgia is received by a defense of the State and of the articles of the Press for allowing Sherman to march through the State.
