#### THE TRIAL OF THE ASSASSINS.

The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia *Advertiser* says:

Charges and specifications against the leading assassins have been finally preferred, and the testimony pretty well arranged. The trial was to have opened on Monday morning, but on the court's party's assembling it was found that another day or two were needed to complete some of the arrangements of the Judge. A new date was set for the trial to begin on Friday evening.

The trials are to be in the penitentiary building at the arsenal, where the criminals are now confined in separate cells.

A large room in the secondary story has been fitted up for the courtroom. It is large enough to hold three hundred persons, and is in the northeast corner of the building, and has four windows, covered with grained iron bars. The room was being cleaned and except the tables, chairs and writing desks, door, and half dozen bookshelves perfectly plain. The walls are white, the whole building having been whitewashed. No traps, nor any device of anything else, to increase the hostility of intended prisoners can be seen.

Judge Adams' bolt will preside at the court, which will be ranged around a long table upon the north side of the room. Parallel to it will be the tables for the official reporters, who will be sworn, and return the testimonies, each, by writing. Next to the photo-graphers is a table for the benefit of counsel should any appear. It is not known that any have been engaged, although there is a rumor that several eminent democratic politicians have refused to do so.

Judge Holt will be aided by Judges Bigelow, of Ohio, and Judge Barnes, both skillful lawyers.

It is said that the Secretary of War is thoroughly conversant with the whole testimony and that the cases have been prepared under his eye.

Major General Hartman has command of the jail and its surroundings, and his dispositions are such that it would be impossible for any attempt to get possession of the prisoners by a mob to succeed.

The trials are to commence just outside the outer walls, while thick iron grilles surround the red-brick building which encloses the wretched criminals, who, in chains with mafles over their heads, are already undergoing a living death. They are not allowed to communicate with the outside world, or the guards who tend them are not allowed to converse with them upon any subject.

ANNUIVERSARY WEEK IN NEW YORK.

The week-opening Saturday the 12th, has been devoted to anniversarys of different associations religious and political. The only important result of these movements was a procession of Wm. Lloyd Garrison, representative of the anti-slavery society, and Wendell Phillips, toward a conclusion of the work.

The editor of the *Post* of New York received the following despatch on the 10th inst.:

Washington, May 9, 1865.  
The three great tea orginizing and manufacturing cities of the Union are to be held in session on the 11th instant, to consider the accommodation for the entire meet and entertain the guests of the jail, and they will probably remain there during the trials.

By Monday evening the machinery will be all in motion, and the cases be pushed rapidly up.

Paris, the assissins of Howard, will probably be first tried.

HAMILTON—Mr. Robert James Brent, of Baltimore.

The other prisoners did not name counsel.

THE ORDER FOR TRIAL.

Executive Chamber, I.

WASHINGTON CITY, May 1, 1865.]

Whereas the Attorney General of the United States has given his opinion that the persons implicated in the murder of the late President, Abraham Lincoln, and the attempted assassination of the Hon. William H. Seward, Secretary of State, and an alleged conspiracy to assassinate other officers of the federal government at Washington city, and their aids and abettors, are subject to the jurisdiction of and legally triable before a military commission:

It is ordered: First—That the Assistant Adjutant General detail nine competent military officers to serve as a commission for the trial of said parties, and that the Judge Advocate General proceed to prefer charges against said parties for their alleged offenses, and bring them to trial before said military commission, that said trial or trials be conducted by the said Judge Advocate General, as recorder thereof, in person, aided by such assistant or special judge advocates as he may designate, and that the trials be conducted with all diligence consistent with the ends of justice, and said commission act without regard to time.

Second—That Major General Burnside be assigned to duty as General-in-Chief of the Armies for the purpose of said trial and attendance upon said commission, and the execution of its mandates.

Third—That the said commission establish such orders or rules of proceeding as may avoid unnecessary delay and concur to the ends of public justice.
