It has been stated that the rebel senator Henry G. Burnett, of Kentucky, has gone to that State to advocate the adoption of the new constitution.

Yale had furnished, in the fall of 1862, two hundred and eight graduates to the army, including four generals, fourteen colonels, four lieutenant colonels, eight majors, thirty-five captains, thirty-six lieutenants, twenty-two surgeons and assistants, twenty-one chaplains.

An important act of labor regulations has been issued by the Superintendent of Freedmen at Augusta, Georgia. The rates of wages for field hands and house servants are fixed.

Information has been received in Washington of the death of J. D. Doty, Governor of Utah Territory.

The Toronto Globe of Saturday says: "We give today the statements, over their own signatures, of three responsible parties, justices of the peace, residing in the county of Waterloo, respecting the character of Dr. Merritt, late of the village of Ayr, one of the secret witnesses against Jefferson Davis and his Canada agents."

The Boston (Md) Gazette says that "a report has been in circulation for several weeks that there is an effort being made by certain parties in Talbot county to bring an influence to bear upon the authorities at Washington to permit the return of the Rebel Commodore Franklin Buchanan. Such a step is one of the greatest insults that the loyal people of this county has ever had perpetrated upon them."

RESIGNED.—Mr. A. L. Lougee, a member of the old Board of Commissioners for Raleigh, and who was re-appointed recently by Gov. Holden, declines the position and has tendered his resignation.

Permission has been granted the Chief Signal Officer of the Army, to muster out all the men of his corps whose term of service expire prior to October 1st.

The Cincinnati Commercial, in noticing a serenade in that city to Senator John Sherman, says "in reply to a question, the Senator said the story that his brother, Gen. Sherman, would consent to be the Democratic candidate for Governor, was a silly falsehood. The General was no going into politics."

The headquarters of the Army of the Potomac, which are now on the Virginia side of the river and near the Long Bridge, are to be broken up in a day or two.
