-There is no end of the j kes and parolics elicited by the New York Tribune reporter's fanciful account of the scenes at the burning of Barrum's Museum .-The Sun supplies an omission in the Tribune's account as follows: "The whale did not burn up; it was swallowed by the enormous alligator; the anaconda then swallowed the alligator; the 'Dying Brigand' swallowed the anaconda; the Tribune reporter swallowed the brigand; and then the reporter perished miserably in attempting to describe his after-dinner emotions." This may be deemed improbable by some persons; not so; stranger things are recorded: a man in Philadelphia swallowed the Tribune's report.

-Despatches by the Ocean Queen, trom Aspinwall, are important and interesting. In the republic Peru the revolution against the government was meeting with great success. Insurgent armies were marching on the capital from both the north and the south, while through a mutiny in the national fleet the insurrectionists, after the commission of great atrocities, had become possessed of the most important vessels of the navy, and everything indicated that they would soon have the entire country under their control. In Ecuador the revolution had been suppressed, and a number of the rebels had been shot. Gen. Barrios, the exiled ex-President of San Salvador, bad returned to that republic and been placed in custody by the authorities. Another revolution in Bolivia was reported. Chile, the most prosperous of the Spanish-American republies, in violation of the fashion prevailing among them, still continued to enjoy peace and quiet, though even here the minds of the people were somewhat agitated by the revival of rumors of prospective difficulty with

-Mexicau news of date to the 14th instant from Vera Cruz was received by the steamship Liberty. It would seem that previous reports in the imperial interest of the republican forces under Negrete having been completely routed and scattered, were not quite in accordance with the facts, since we are now informed that three separate columns of imperialists, under Generals Brincourt, Jeanmingros and Mejia, had been sent against him, each on a different route ; but although it is stated that one of these commands skirmished with his rear guard, it is not claimed that Negret , who is said to have been retreating, was seriously interfered with. In that, the triple expedition is admitted to be a failure, and an effort is made to saive it over by announcing the occupation by Maximilian troops of Saltilio, Camargo, Monterey and Piedras Negras places which are known to have been previously in their possession. .

At Havana, on the 19th inst., the people, for want of something more important, were exciting themselves over a letter to the Queen of Spain, signed by some of the wealthy Cohans, to the one sent Genera Serrano, thanking him for his motion for reforms and political suffrage for Cuba. It is expected that Gen. Dulce will continue for some time yet to be Captain General of Cuba. Within the week ending on the 16th six additional steamers, conveying Spanish troops, officers and war paraphernalia from St. Domingo, had arrived at Havana; and still the evacuation, which has now been many months in progress, was not completed.

-By the steamship Zodiac we have our Savannah despatches to the 20th inst. In contradiction of reports that the yellow fever was prevailing at that place, it is stated that not a single case of this disease has yet made its appearance there or at any other place in Georgia this season. The health of the State generally is represented to be very good. Business at Savannah was improving, and things were gradually approaching a condition of prosperity.

OUR PUBLIC MORALS .- Without wishing to be understood as discriminating against any of those officers who have been previously connected with the immediate military rule in Raleigh, it is only just to say that the present authorities have sueceeded in giving us more quiet than any of their predecessors, or else the people and soldiers, satisfied with evil and unlawfulness, have embraced ar more correct system of morals. But we are disposed to place the credit to the management of the affairs of this post, and as a logical sequence to the officers and soldiers attached. Four years experience in military life has furnished the writer of this unmistakable proof that where there is proper firmness and resolution evinced, it is a matter of the easiest attainment under military rule to enforce law and order. Besides, where there are considerable bodies of troops, a relaxation of proper discipline never fails of promoting collisions between citizens and soldiers. It is equally true that such a condition of affairs can readily be avoided by the simple use of the means provided in army regula

We believe that there is now a disposition here to do this in the full. The orders so far issued attest this spirit, and we refer to it that the government at Washington may see who are now faithful as in the past. It is now the province of army officers and their garrisons to inaugurate good morals; to promote good feeling; to stimulate harmony; and to found a wholesome sentiment of devotion to the Union. They can only do so by enforcing high respect for law and illustrating it in their own conduct, and by impartial administration of justice. Nothing is to be gained by irritating applications and we believe there is a purpose in this military district to have one code : equal and exact justice to all.

Certain it is, drunkeness has been greatly diminished; disturbances are less frequent; and even belligerent displays in action and word are rarely seen. They are all the resultants of firm local policy, and we sincerely trust that there will be no retrograde movement in favor of the olden disor-
