The old-time fashion of silk skirts opening over white muslin or satin petticoats is again coming in vogue. The following will serve as a model:

A pale, mauve silk skirt, opened at each breadth from the bottom to about a quarter of a yard up the skirt; straps of white or other contrasting silk are used to hold them together over the underskirt, and a tissel corresponding in color is sewn at each end of the strap. The bodice is made of the same material as the underskirt, with a corselet of silk to match the dress skirt worn over it, and laced with cord corresponding in color with the straps on the skirt.

We learn that the newest thing in that ever-varying covering for the head is known as the lozenge bonnet. It is made either of rice or Belgian straw, and describes a lozenge on the head, confining five smaller ones, which are made of either pink or lilac ribbons.
