THE NEWS.

The Union State Committee of New York met on Thursday at the Astor House and prepared a call for the State Convention. It will be composed of three delegates from each Assembly District, and will meet at Syracuse on the 20th of September.

An opportunity has been afforded by the government, to owners of farms upon which forts have been erected, to receive the buildings and other property left in dismantling the works as compensation already accepted the offer, but were not returned a large amount of valuable property unaccepted, requiring guards for its protection, it is probable that the government will shortly withdraw the offer, remove the buildings, &c., and leave the owners of lands the unpromising alternative of getting their claims for compensation through Congress.

The Washington Republican understands that Maj. Gen. Philip H. Sheridan indorses the proposition of the merchants and planters of the South-west set forth in their petition to the President, to tax all cotton 15 per cent, and to abandon its attempt to confiscate any of the staple on account of any supposed right acquired by the United States on account of it having been claimed by the Confederate Government as its property.

It is stated that, in addition to the vessels here before mentioned, the whaling bark Pearl, of New London, was destroyed in the Pacific Ocean by the rebel pirate Shenandoah. The last heard from the Shenandoah was on the 23d of June, when she was steering for a fleet of some sixty whalers in the Arctic Ocean, with a prospect of effecting their destruction, though energetic efforts had been made to give them timely warning.

A communication has been received at the War Department from General Sully, conducting the military expedition against the Indians in Dakota Territory, in which he very confidently expresses the opinion that a permanent peace can now be secured by the government with the Sioux and Cheyenne tribes on the Upper Missouri river.

A meeting of the Richmond Press was held on Saturday to take steps to give President Johnson a proper reception on the occasion of his expected visit to Richmond. A committee was appointed to request a meeting of the citizens to perfect the arrangements.

The Democrats of Minnesota held their convention for the nomination of State officers on Wednesday, the 16th inst. Resolutions were adopted sustaining the reconstruction policy of the President; in favor of the Monroe doctrine; opposing a protective tariff, and denouncing the suspension of the writ of habeas corpus.

The Rebel General Slaughter has published a letter, in which he fully exculpates General Meija and the Imperial forces from the charge of aiding the Confederates. He says that not a rifle or a musket ever crossed the Rio Grande or otherwise entered the Confederacy through the Imperial lines.

A Lexington dispatch says the Senate of Kentucky will stand—Union, 17; Democratic, 21. We have gained enough in this part of the State to give us the Lower House, but we cannot tell how the Southern portion of the State has voted.

The Ohio "Democratic State Sovereignty Convention" met at Columbus on the 18th, and nominated ex-Congressman Alexander Long for Governor. Strong State Sovereignty resolutions were adopted.

A Mr. Stowe eloped from Burlington, Vt., last week, with the wives of three prominent citizens.—All the women were mistresses of the scamp. The guilty parties crossed the Canada border closely pursued by one of the wronged husbands.

The census of the blacks of Memphis is being taken, and it is estimated that there are over 20,000 of them in that city, or more than half of the whole population.

Gov. Parsons of Alabama has deposed the Mayor of Montgomery. A new Mayor is to be appointed, who will accept an agency of the Freedman's Bureau.

A conductor on the Erie railroad has absconded after robbing the company of a large amount.

Gen. Grant left Chicago for Galena on the 18th.

Duncan R. McRae and John Minor Botts, were at the Presidential Mansion on the 18th.

A woman in San Francisco drowned herself because she was not going to be married.

The publication of the Richmond Enquirer will be resumed at an early day.

Senator Doolittle, of Wisconsin, is at Washington city.

The soldiers demolished several houses of ill fame in Salisbury a few nights ago.

The venerable William and Mary College, at Williamsburg, Va., is about to be reopened. Some of its buildings and a portion of its funds have been saved.

THE CITY.

SWORN PRESENTATION.—On Tuesday, previous to the departure of the regiment, the members of Co. "H," of the 3d Infantry N. Y. Volunteers made a handsome presentation of a sword, sash, belt and revolver to their commander first Lieutenant Milton J. Brown, as a mark of their appreciation of his kindness and gentlemanly conduct while in command of the company. Mr. William F. Graham in a few brief remarks eulogized the character of Lieut. Brown, while he detailed the many acts of generosity experienced by the company at his hands.—Lieut. Brown in a neat and eloquent speech replied, dwelling on the good conduct of the men, and concluded by saying that he should ever prize the gift in memory of the members of "H" Co. The whole affair came off with great éclat, the entire company (100 strong) being present in line, and several members from other companies of the regiment.

It must be deeply gratifying to the authorities at Washington to know that they have such officers in their service as Lieut. Brown, who while he yields to none in the discharge of his duties can by his kindness and gentlemanly demeanor enlist the sympathy and admiration of the men of his command.

PROVOST COURT, AUG. 23.—Several trivial matters disposed of in the usual way.

The negro shot by private Ryan of the 3rd N. Y., noticed yesterday, has since died. Ryan had not been apprehended at 3 p. m. It is said the soldier loaded his gun with corn to try an experiment on the negro, and if so, he was no doubt astonished at the result.

S. T. Deane, the absconding clerk noticed yesterday, reached the city Tuesday evening and was sent to the county jail.

IMPORTANT TO TRAVELLERS.—There has been great inquiry by persons desirous of going south to know what amount of unfinished road there may be between here and Augusta, Ga. A gentleman connected officially with one of the lines states that there is an unfinished work of ten miles between Kingsville, S. C., and Barchville and another of forty miles between Branchville and Auzetta. The roads from Augusta to Mofite are said to be in a proper running order.

LEAVE TO DAY.—The 4th New Hampshire Regiment leave for home to day. Many of the boys of the 4th have become attached to the "City of O. Ks.," and we are not surprised to learn that some of them will return again. Fair wind and a pleasant sail to the toys of the 4th.

ANOTHER CHANGE.—Capt. J. E. McIver 26th Michigan Infantry, took possession of the Provost Sanctum yesterday, relieving Capt. Adams who goes home with his regiment.

PERS NAL.—We are glad to hear that Gov. Holden is rapidly recovering his health though of this there could be no doubt, as he is spending a short time at Kittler's Springs, where the Dr. never fails in restoring his guests.

MR. MILLER the newly appointed Postmaster for this city has received his commission, and will at once enter upon the discharge of the duties of the office.

Conscript Hunters. A correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette, who is making a tour through the mountain districts of Western North Carolina, writes from Danbury:

Each county had an organization composed of men exempted for various reasons, and it was their duty to hunt down and capture, dead or alive, all deserters, conscripts and men who had "taken to the bush" to avoid conscription. This was the direction in which numbers of men with their capital looked to secure exemption. Many think their duty as often as they can. Still, as an apparent lack of willingness to perform it insured the fulfilment of their exemption and involved the necessity of entering the army, the best Union men were compelled to hunt at times. But it was strange how few conscripts these men found. Still, the majority were ever zealous in the work, lest they might be relieved and sent to the front. Hundreds of men have been shot down in cold blood, their property destroyed and their families turned out to starve.

Husbands, fathers and sons have been fed for three years in these woods by wives and children; and often the steps of these were tracked to find the hiding place, and, when found, murder almost always followed. We saw many who had lived in caves since the first conscription. Now nearly all of this persecuting class are the most forward in their protestations of Unionism, and some are even aspiring to office. They do not seem to feel the "degradation and deep humiliation of returning to the old Union as keenly as Governor Perry, of South Carolina, does. One of the worst of this class, who not long since took an old, gray-headed man from his plough and hung him, on the charge of harboring deserters, and destroyed the furniture of a poor widow for the same reason, ran for constable at a meeting of the magistrates, and only lacked a few votes of an election.

Gen. Stedman has issued an order providing that, in the absence of the civil courts, and in localities where no agency of the Freedmen's Bureau is established, all questions of wages and debts between freedmen and the whites will be decided by the provost marshals. The contracts between such parties will be adhered to, unless procured by fraud. Provision is also made for compensation to freedmen driven away by former owners after an engagement it has been made; also where a freedman has been maltreated and leaves his employment. Vagrants and idlers are to be arrested and put to hard labor. Provost marshals shall collect all money found due to freedmen and pay it over to them. Offices have been opened in Savannah, Augusta, and other places, where ladies can have the amiable aid administered to them.
