-Copper has been discovered in Maryland. . -A paper styled The Independent African, un der joint proprietorship of a white and a colored man, is to be started in Charleston, S. C.

-Despatches describe the potato rot as alarming and prevalent in various sections of Michigan.

-Rebel General Gordon, was figured so prominently in the Virginia campaigns, is now keeping a grocery store in Atlanta, Ga.

-On the recommendation of Gov. Sharkey, John A. Neleim was appointed Collector of Customs at Vicksburg, Miss.

-It is reported that Gen. Sherman has purchased the beautiful three story brick mansion recently erected by David Nicholson, Esq., on Garrison-ave, between Franklin and Eastern-aves., St.

-The war between Paraguay and the Argentine Republic shows no signs of termination. Rains had retarded military operations, tut hostilities were about to commence on an imposing sc le .-Large armies were being raised by volunteers and conscriptions.

-Major Gen. Herron de sided to act on the Fort Gibson Indian commission, but is at St. L misson his way to New Orleans on a private mission for the Government to the S uth.

-At the Indian Conneil at Fort Smith on Tarsday communications were received from the Seminoles and Creeks. Gov. Pitchleym, the Rabel Chief of the Cherok es, has arrived.

-The manufacture of boots and since in the Southern States in 1860, was represented by 1,365 establishments, with an invested capital of \$1 441,-772, and producing annually products amounting in value to \$3,973,313 The east of raw material consumed amounted: \$1641 330; the cost of lapor annually, \$1,403.058; the namer of male hands employed, 4,000; and the number of females 315.

-Colonel F. Banva reports that the fears of a negro insurrection in Varginia sometimes expressed are perfectly grou dl as General Terry, who has investigated closely the reports, is of the same opindon. General Terry's troops are so disposed that such a movement on the part of the freedmen could be put down at once. To Freelmen's Bireau is organized and has gants watching the blacks in every county of the State, except some portions of the Shenaudoah valley

- General Swayne, lo Alabama, has ordered that all contracts with freed ues for labor must be reduced to writing and approved by the agent of the hureau for plantation labor. Employers will stipulate to provide sufficient food and quarters, medical attendance, and such further compensation as may be agreed upon. Such contracts are to be a lien upon crops, of which not more than half is to be removed until a full payment be made, and the contract released by the agent of the bureau. Absentees from labor without good cause shall be proceeded against as vagrants. and freedmen committed as vagrants may be set to work on the road or other labor, or be turned over to the freedmen's bureau. Governor Parsons and General Wood approved the order, and directed its enforcement.

-Herschel V. Johnson, of Georgia, has returned to Washington from a visit to Alexander H Stephens in Fort Warren. He spent last Friday with Mr. Stephens, and reports him in ordinary health and as comfortably situated as any one can be in confinement. He has the freed om of the fort, and is al'owed to receive the visits of friends. Quite as many are admitted as he desires to receive. His brother, Linton Stephens, who accompanied Mr. Johnson to Fort Warren, remains there still, and is permitted to sleep in his brother's apartments and join him in his walks for exercise. Mr. Stephens will probably not be pard-ued until the question of reconstruction is practically settled by the admission of representatives from the Southern States.

-A special despatch from Montgomery to the Mobile News says that many influential citizens of Maringo, and the adjacent counties, have petitioned Governor Parsons, asking for the removal of Colonel Lynch, of the 5th Wiscopsin cavalry, as his open sentiments would lead to a negro rebellion against the whites, bloodshed being imminent.

-The Louisville Journal inclines to the belief that there is more lying about matters, and things in the South just now, than there has been for twenty five years, quoting as an example the statement of a New York Herald correspondent, that Mr. Howell, the father-in-law of Jeff. Divis, had expressed the wish that his son-ie-law might be banged; whereas, according to the Vicksburg Herald, said Mr. Howell | letter of Judge Mitchel , extending his jurisdiction has been dead about three years.

-On the evening of the 21 jest, says a dispatch to the Chicago Tribune, a negro soldier in an altercation with a white man at Cairo, I !., whom he alleged struck him, drew his bayonet, and, pursuing his assailant, who fled in the presence of the weapon, caught up with him in a house near by the scene of the dispute, where he knocked him down and literally transfixed him to the floor with it, killing him almost instantly. The murderer was arrested and lodged in prism. I is said the effair originated with the negro, who very ins dently justled the man, whose remonstrance provoked him to murder.

-Davemport, I wa was a good deal agitated over the attempt of a man to cut his throat and pull out the tongue of his own wife at a hotel on Saturday .--They were strangers a d claimed to be from Iowa City. He had been a neutenant in the 31 Cavairy.

COURTS OF OVER AND TERMINER -The following correspondence is published that the people of the State may know what efforts are being made by the Provisional Governor to establish the civil courts in this State, and as warning to evil doers.

Several other counties have made application for courts of Over and Terminer, and in a few days another Judge will be sent to them. There are some evidences of a disposition to lawlessness in certain parts of the State, and the only sure 'corrective—the civil courts—will by brought to bear to arrest it :-

partment of North Carolina: Sir:-I have appointed Judge Auderson Mitchell t shold courts of Over and Terminer in several of the counties west of the B ue Rilgs, and have giv n hom the following directions with regard to his jurisdiction, a copy of which is forwarded to you for you information:

"You will not take jurisdiction of cases of wrongs committed by fre-dmen or free persons of color, or wrongs committed against them by white persons or freedmen or free persons of color. The laws of Nort : Carolina do not admit the testi nony of freed ne cor free persons of color in cases wherein white persons are concerned, and the military authorities will not allow them to be tried in courts which do not admit their testimony. All such cases will, therefore, be left to be tried by the military courts. Your jurisdiction will extend to all breaches of the criminal law of North Carolina by white persons against white

I would suggest that it might serve a good purpose for the protection of the freedmen and free persons of color, if this jurisdiction were extended to allow the judge to arrest and have bound over to keep the peace all persons whether white or of color-to require bail when the case is bailable at common law, and where not, to lodge the offender in the county jail, subject to the orders of the military comman lers of the dis rict. Otherwise the persons of color will be and will feel themselves in a very helpless con !!tion in those counties out of the reach of the direct authority of the mi itary.

Should you co our with me. I will send such directions as will extend the Julge's jurisdiction in this latter respect.

The Provisional Governor would have preferred that the civil courts should have been parmitted to have this and unrestricted juris liction, as he is confident that the freedmen and free persons of color would bey received justice at the hands of the whites as they have heretofore. Bit the orders which the int mary authorities have received will not

pernet this. Some weeks ago a correspondence between Gen. T. H Rager and the Provisional Governor, on this subject, was published in the Standard and this correspandence has been referred to the President for his action, and until his answer is received the above must be the division of jurisdiction between the military and civil courts.

Six of the eight Julges who have been appointed Judges of courts of Over and Terminer will be memhere of the Convention, and it is for this reason that the regoing Judges have been specially appointed to hold courts out of their regular circuits.
