-Gen. J L. Kernan, late of United States Army, is about to "stump" New Jer-ey for the Union ticket. Gen. Kernan canvassed Ohio, Kentucky and Pennsylvania last Fall for Lincoln and John-

-Probably the first practical case of punish ment in the army for miscegnation is that of Capt. E. J. Scranton, 28th United State Colored Troops, who has been tried by court martial on the charge of cohab ting within camp, and afterwards marrying a colored woman of bad reputation, and sentenced to be dismissed service. The offence was commited in Gen. Gillmore's Department.

-News from San Demingo represents the country as quiet. The Protector Babral has imprisoned his predecessor in power, P mental, and his admirers. Preparations were making for the election of a permanent President.

-We have received news from Havana to the 15th inst. The army in Cuba has been reduced by a royal decree to the same footing as before the campaign in San Domingo.

-Colchester, the Buffal medium, has been fined forty dollars and condemne I to pay the costs of the trial, amounting to four hundred and seventy-three dollars.

-Burley, the Like Erie rirate, escaped from juil at Port Cinton, O., on Sunday afternoon. A reward of \$100 is offered for his capture.

-The Micon (Gi) Telegraph announces the arrival of G v. Brown there, on the 13 h ist., direct from Washington. In a personal interview he expressed himself highly pleased with the feeling manifisted towards the States of the South by the authorities at Washington, and the utmost confidence that prudent action on the part of the people of those States would speedily restore them to the enjoyment of equal rights, as members of the U ion.

-The old Nashville Bunner, one of the oldest papers published in Tennisses before the war, and for many years the Whig organ of that Sate, will be revived in a few days.

.- Hin. John Cessna Chairman of the U In State Central C mmittee of P nney viola, in an ad Iress to the people of that State says "that negro suffrage and nigro i quality are not, and could not p sainly be an issue in the October contest" for officers in Pennsyl-

-Accounts from Constantinople state that 2 800 buildi gs were destroyed by the great fire, and upwards of 22,000 persons were rendered houseless .-The cholera has alm st enti ely disappeared.

-Recently twenty thousand dollars of Internal R venue stamps were mailed in Pailadelphia for delivery in N .w Y .rk, but the non-receipt if the package caused a suspicion that it had been purloined from the mail. An investigation was made by A. R Waller, special agent of the Postoffice D partment, who ascertained that the package had been sent to N w O leans in mistake. The pack ge and contents were received without loss.

-Applications from banks to be designated as United States depositories are received in great numbers by the S cretary of the Treasury. Not more than one out of every twenty of the ap lications receive a favorable consideration, for already in nearly every region of the country, save the South, there have been more depositories designated than is warranted by the exigencies of the government or the various communities in which they are located. In view of this fact, the Secretary of the Treasury has determined to sparingly disignate banks for the purpose named, and as near as possible confine the number in thickly populated regions to one United States depository to each Ungressional D strict. In sparsely settled communities the number will be still less.

-Gov. Randall, Acting Postmuster General, ordered the reopening of twelve additional Southern Posts ffices, among which are Morehead City, Abbeville, Snow Hill, Lincolton, Plymouth, Washington county, John B. Chison, jr., postmaster, and Columbia, Tyrell county, Wm. L. Spraill postmaster, all in this State.

-A dispatch from Fort Laramie announces the defeat of a force of Indians by Gen. Connor, on the 28th of August. The action occurred near Horn. Four hundred head of cattle were captured Our forces lost a considerable number in killed and wounded. We learn from Fort Smith that the commissioners adhere to their action in regard to John Ross, and issures the loyal Cherokees that their rights shall be respected.

-Fort Pulaski, with its frowning parapets lined with the savage dogs of war, is at present a plice of considerable interest, containing within its battered, war begrimed, historic walls several distinguished prisoners of the late Confederate States .-Among the prominent men now confined there are Gov Magrath, of South Carolina; G.
