Last Thursday evening, just preceding the proclamation of adjournment, he delivered himself of the following chaste address-an appropriate farewell from the President to the membership of the toly over which

Gentlemen of the Convention : Our work is finished! The breach in our government, so far as the same was by force, has been overcome by force, and so far as the same had the sanction of legislation, that legislation has been declared to be null and void. So that there remains nothing to be done except the withdrawal of military power, when our governmental relations will be restored without further asking on the part of the State, or giving on the part of the United States.

The elements of slavery, which has so long distracted and divided the sections, has, by a unanimous vote, been abolished. Every man in the State is free. The reluctance which for a while was felt to the sudden and radical change in our domestic relations, a reluctance which was made oppressive to us. by our own kind feelings for the slave, and by our apprehensions of the evils which were to follow him. has yielded to the determination to be to him as we always have been, his best friend; to advise, protect. educate and elevate him; to seek his confidence and to give him curs; and each occupying appropriate positions toward the other, to cherish for the past and cultivate for the future those strong and mutual attachments which have been hallowed at the hearthstone, in the church, in the sick room, and at the

It remains for us to return to our constituents and engage with them in the great work of restoring our belov d State to order and prosperity.

As long as I remember any thing with pleasure. my heart will beat taster when I reflect, gentlemen, upon your kindness to me. You have honore! me with your confidence and excused my imperfections I have not to remember a single discourtesy. Fellow-Citizens:

In compliance with the wishes of a number of the citizens of the Fifth Congressional District I have consented to place my name before you as a candidate for a seat in the House of Ropresentatives of the Congress of the United States. This trust, at all times one of great responsibility, is rendered peculiarly so in the present extraordinary juncture of our public

Just emerged, as we have, from one of the most sanguinary and disastrous wars, which history records, with our constitutional relations to the government not yet entirely restored, the crisis demands the ut nost prudence and the most disinterested patriotism, to attain this most desirable result. It is true that the Convention of the State has fully responded to the wishes of the people of the State, and by its action has done every thing in its power towards accomplishing that end, yet it is still subject to the decision of the national authorities.

First in the list of duties inscribed among those that appertain to the representative trust, is to aid, by all henorable means, the complete restoration of the State to those relations with the federal Union, which for mear a century, so happily and beneficially subsisted be ween them. need not say, that this with me, if honored with your confidence, would be the first and most

cherished object of my wishes. No duty would be so pleasing as to aid in restoring our State to the noble government which Washington and his compatriots of the revolution gave us. Let us then, again, seek to share that great inheritance of which we have for a time been deprived by a most extrao dinary infatuation. Let us seek to unite in fraternal bonds with that great family of States which constitutes the greatest and freest government in ancient and modern times. At the same time let us cast the mantle of charity over former differences of opinion, and regard those who differed with us as friends and patriots, who now unite with us in the great work of recon-

struction. In the policy of President Johnson, I behold the path of peace, safety and honor, to conduct us through these difficulties. While he stands on national ground, as the partizan of no one section and as equally the friend of all, he is our intrepid defender against the meditated aggressions of revolutionary radicalism. As one, cordially, uniting in his official capacity, in the plans and policy of President Johnson, it is only simple justice to Governor Holden, to say, that he has most faithfully and beneficially exerted his authority to that end, and has pursued a course which entitles him to decided public

Impoverished and exhausted, as our State has been, by the results of the late war, it will be peculiarly the duty of those who represent her in the Congress to endeavor to lighten her barthens as much as practicable with respect to taxation, and to obtain from the government such indulgence as can be had with regard to

the taxes, for which the State is now subject. As respects our foreign relations, peace and frieudship with all, entangling alliances with none, asking what is right, and submitting to nothing which is wrong, should be the maxims and the policy of our government as they were

in the best days of the Republic. I trust my course for many years past is not altogether unknown, on the question of the Federal Union. In the Senate of the United States, more than thirty years since, in the debate on the force bill, against the nullification ordinance of South Carolina, I declared, in a speech delivered by me on that occasion, that a dissolution of the Union would result in the establishment of a military despotism. Afterwards, when extreme men of the South and North agitated the slave question, as I then and now believe, from mischevious motives, I resisted it, in opposition to both extremes, as tending to a dissolution of the Union In 1860 and '61, when 'he moveme t in favor of secession was first made in our Legislature, I was then a member of the State Senate, and made every effort which I was capable of making in opposition to it.

This I continued to do till every Southern State had seceded and the war had commenced, leaving no doubt if North Carolina remained inderest by hem, providing their remitrance amounts evitable, and that she would become the battleground of both the Confederate and Federal armies. To avoid that calamity, the State, opposed, as she ever had been, to disunion, yielded her own carnest wishes to the pressure of circumstance, and went with her Southern sister

States. I am confident it was done in the hope, by the people, that their patriotic counsels would maderate those of their Southern sisters, and ultimately obtain an adjustment by which the Union would be restored. During the entire war, I have no doubt, if the freedom of opinion had not been suppressed, that North Carolina was, at all times, in favor of an honorable settlement of the question. Such were my own anxious wishes. as I always regarded a dissolution of the Union as bringing with it military despotism and the abolition of slavery. Those who were in power at Richmond, however, pursued a different course, and the result has been such a sacrifice as no people have suffered The restoration of the Federal Union gives assurance of peace and civ l liberty. Disunion is civil war, anarchy, military despotism and all its attendant evils. The reestablishment of the Federal Union nobly vindicates the principles of republican freedom, and proclaims the great principle so much denied by titled orders-that man is capable of self-government.

Such are the views entertained by me on general questions of public policy, briefly and hastily written, amidst public engagements If it shall be your pleasure to elect me as your representative. I shall regard it as a distinguished mark of public favor, and my best efforts will be directed to the advancement of the public good. Most respectfully
