The report of the Attorney-General relative to pardons is now almost completed. The re-port comprehends only those persons included in the 181c exception or \$20,000 clause. There will probably be from 18,000 to 15,000 of this class, and under other exceptions there are about as many more, making from 25,000 to 30,000 pardons already issued. Virginia, Alabama, Georgia, and North Carolina lead the other Southern States in the number of those who have received Excentive clemency. Only a few Rebel officers of high rank have been pardoned, and hardly any Southerners educated at West Point, who descried the United States service to enter the Confederate army. It is not gener-ally understood that women in the South own-ing property require pardon and that a large number of this class have applied for and re-ceived Executive clemency. It may not be im-proper to state that the property of loyal South-ern residents has been restored in but few in stances.
