**FOREIGN.**  
New-York, November 8.  
Foreign News.—By the arrival yesterday afternoon of the elegant ship Importer, Captain Hall, in the remarkable short passage of 22 days from Liverpool, we have received our regular files of London papers and shipping lists to the 22d of October, and Liverpool papers to the 25th of that month.

London Oct. 12.  
A paper of this morning says:—There appears very strong probability that our ports will be thrown open on the 15th of next month, for the free import of foreign wheat; and in all likelihood oats will be above the average price, and be also admitted. One beneficial effect will result from the opening of the ports: it will tend to increase, give employment for the shipping, and probably open a vent for British manufactured goods. It is calculated that 130,000 quarters of foreign wheat are already under the King's lock, waiting the event of the averages on the 15th.

A dreadful fire broke out at Constantinople on the 10th of August, which destroyed 1200 houses and 6000 shops and magazines. The Janissaries, it is said did not display their usual alacrity in extinguishing the flames. The palace of their late favorite Jussuf Aga, was the only building in the destroyed quarter which remained unharmed.

A gentleman who left Calais on the 9th inst. states that the country along the coast presented a melancholy picture, the crops of corn rotting on the ground, some cut and some uncut, and a scarcity apprehended in consequence, except in the article of oats, of which there appeared to be a large quantity.

A private letter from Paris, of the 6th inst. says:—A most alarming disposition has manifested itself, particularly within the last two days among the lower classes. The cause is not less alarming—a rise in the price of bread. The behaviour of the populace in several parts of Paris has been so violent that many individuals have been arrested by the Police.

October 17.—According to a paragraph from Naples, the Americans have considerably abated their pretensions, in consequence of which an arrangement was about to be effected. The price has been raised the price of 45s. per barrel, on account of the great advance on unit and hops.

October 18.—A vessel arrived last week from St. Helena, which was put under embargo for some time, and an officer brought dispatches up to government. The nature of them has not transpired, but they seem important from the secrecy that has been observed.

Government Contract.—An extraordinary sensation was excited in the city on Saturday, at the proposal made by the government to contract for 5000 tierces of pork and 5000 tierces of beef; but it should be recollected that formerly the Americans supplied provisions to the West India Islands, because they could afford to do so on easier terms, than could be obtained in England.—Now provisions in America are at the rate of 15 3s. per barrel, when the same kind in England are at 15 10s. The difference of price, together with the policy of supplying our colonies from home, may account for the proposed contract of Government.

Liverpool Oct. 14.—We understand a mercantile house in that town has received information from Copenhagen that the trade to Iceland is now laid open to all nations, subject to the regulations prescribed by the royal ordinance dated at Copenhagen the 14th of September last.

Liverpool Oct. 16.—The Grand Duke Constantine, the Emperor of Russia's brother, arrived on Saturday in London.

Algiers, state of the city since the battle.—We have the pleasure to announce intelligence from Algiers since the departure of the British squadron from those shores. His majesty's ship Prometheus, Captain Dashwood, arrived on Sunday se'night from the Mediterranean. She sailed from Algiers on the 20th ult. and left the city in a very disturbed state. For some time after the departure of the British fleet, the Turkish soldiers and the inhabitants appeared regardless of their ruined city. On the 10th of Sept. the soldiers broke out into open tumults and offered to the Dey the choice of losing his own head, or of permitting the murder of all the Jews and Moors, and the plunder of the city. The Dey indignantly offered himself to be the sacrifice of their rage; but afterwards, by some largesses, he composed their turbulence. They then began to clear away the rubbish from the streets, and to make the ramparts appear less ruinous, by filling up the chasms in them with mortar and loose stones. But, up to the time of the Prometheus sailing, few or no endeavors were made towards the permanent repairs of the batteries. No insult was offered to the crew of the Prometheus, though the Dey more than once expressed his indignation, that a British ship should remain stationary in the bay.

The French papers state, that the Dey has taken umbrage at the conduct of the emperor of Morocco, whom he charges with not having observed the stipulations of treaties, and from whom he demands satisfaction. He accuses

him of having favoured his enemies. The Dey hopes to embroil him with the English.

France.—The returns of the new chamber of deputies are nearly completed with the exception of those from Corsica and the Lower Alps. Though many of the ultra royalists have been successful, some of the most eminent of them have lost their elections.

Spain.—The queen of Spain and her sister arrived in Madrid on the 28th ult. The marriage ceremony, which connected the princess, who is represented as young and lovely, with the beloved Ferdinand for life, was celebrated on the following day. Ferdinand immediately issued a decree of amnesty and general pardon for all those offenders in Spain, whose punishment can be remitted without danger to society on account of his marriage. But none of the patriots are included in this amnesty.

The emperor of Russia is arrived at Warsaw. The new Messiah.—The story of a Jew having collected a large army in the neighbourhood of Basylou, is now acknowledged to be a fabrication.

Maria Louisa.—Maria Louisa remained near six weeks at Florence, where her health improved surprisingly. She received with affability the inhabitants of distinction, and a few French gentlemen. It was remarked she often spoke of her husband, and ever with the most affectionate attachment. She became very popular, appearing daily in her carriage, unattended, in every part of the town.

Boston Nov. 18.  
Our accounts from France, through the medium of the Paris prints, are auspicious to the cause of Louis; but private letters darken the face of the political horizon of that country.—The sudden dissolution of the Chamber of Deputies, may be presumed to have created much sensation in the public mind; but remote as we are from the scene of action, and indistinct as our accounts must necessarily be, it will be wise to wait the assembling of the new Deputies, and see what their schemes are, before we make up our judgement of the wisdom or folly of the measure.

Agreeably to the treaty of Paris the King of Prussia, has granted an assylum in his kingdom to all persons comprised in the French Ordinance of July 30, 1815, and to those proscribed by the additional law of amnesty. [In the former are included Soult, Carnot, &c. and in the latter Fouche, and all who voted for the murder of Louis 16th.]

Party spirit runs high in Sweden, against Bernadotte, and his family. The Swedes think the military talents of an alien are not now necessary for their protection, it is therefore, likely, that Bernadotte will follow the fate of his old master, and descend from the regal eminence to which circumstances elevated him; and that the native royal race will be recalled to the throne of their ancestors. Though the exiled king of Sweden, Gustav. Adolphus, is too much a lunatic to be entrusted with power, his son is considered a youth of promise, and has just entered his 13th year. He has been educated and patronised by his aunt, the present Empress of Russia.

His Holiness has denounced certain fashionable habits of the Ladies of Rome—and he has been pleased to forbid the tight inexpressibles of the Gentlemen.

St. Petersburg Sept. 7.  
His Excellency Count Nesselrode has addressed the following circular to the foreign Ambassadors and Ministers:—

"The Emperor having judged necessary to ascertain in person, the state of the provinces which suffered most by the residence of the enemy, and to hasten by his presence the execution of the measures adopted for effacing the traces of those evils, has determined to undertake a journey, into the interior of his empire. His majesty has accordingly proceeded in the first place to Moscow. He will afterwards visit the neighbouring governments, after which he will repair to Warsaw to strengthen the measures of an administration newly formed under his care, and to give the necessary development to his plans for establishing, on the most durable foundations, and under the protection of the Peace and the Conventions concluded at Vienna, the future happiness of his new subjects.

"The Emperor, in prescribing to the undersigned to notify his journey to M—, at the same time directed him to enter into these details, in order to prevent any interpretation which might assign other motives to this journey.

"The Emperor confided to the undersigned the honorable office of maintaining during his absence, the ordinary relations with the diplomatic Body accredited at his Court. He has therefore the honor to beg that M—, will address to him any communications, he may have to make on the part of his Court, and that he will be assured of the eagerness with which he will bring the same under the cognizance of his august master, with whom he will seize all opportunities of contributing every thing in his power to the consolidation of the union which so happily exists between the two Courts.

"The undersigned seizes this opportunity to renew to M—, the assurance of his most distinguished consideration.

"NESSELRODE."
