REPORT ON THE COMPENSATION LAW.

[The following well written report, on the subject of the Compensation Act, is from the pen of Mr. Webster, of New-Hampshire. It will be found extremely well worth the perusal of those who condemn as well as of those who approve the policy of that law; and, as most of the articles on the subject, which have appeared in the Star, were against the measure, we consider it a point of duty to give this a place.]

The committee to whom was referred the consideration of the expediency of repealing or modifying the law past at the last session, relative to the compensation of members of Congress, ask leave to REPORT—

The power, vested in Congress by the constitution, of providing for the pay of its own members, is doubtless, a delicate trust; and it might have been apprehended, as well from the nature of the subject, as from former experience, that the most judicious exercise of that trust would not be exempt from some degree of public animadversion. The committee, however, cannot perceive, either in the increase of compensation provided by the late act, or in the mode of making that compensation, cause of excitement or alarm, adequate to the effects which are un-
