MISCELLANY.

THE ROCK MERIDAIL

Nearly a century ago, several travellers of respectability, at different times, visited the tract of country over which the Israelites passed in their journey from the Red Sea to the Promised Land. In examining the region in the unighborhood of mount Sinai, they severally discovered, among other evidences of the Mosaic history, the rock Meribah, from which the Great Jewish Leader, in a miraculous manner, drew water for the immense host of his countrymen. Two of these travellers was Shaw and Pococke, two Englishmen of respectability and integrity. As their description of this monument of antiquity, so interesting for the corroboration which it affords to the Sacred Historian, and so venerable for having been the object upon which was wrought so wonderful a miracle as that above mentioned, are so minute and satisfactory, we have transcribed them N. Y. Daily Adv. for publication.

" After we had descended with no small rs, Valaga and Country Wines -Loat and thrown Sugar, difficulty down the western side of this mountaine and Chocolate -Imperial and Young Hyson Teas.

Almost and Rasius, Powder and Shot, Candles and Soop, tain, we came into the other plain that is formed by it, which is Rephidim. Here we still see that extraordinary antiquity the Rock of Meribah, which hath continued down to this day without the least injury from time or accidents. It is a block of grante marble, about four yards square, lying tottering as it were, and loose in the middle of the valley, and seems to have formerly belonged to Mount Sinai, which hangs in a variety of precipices all over this plain. The waters which gushed out and the stream which flowed withal, have hollowed across one corner of this tock, a channel about two inches deep and twenty wide, appearing to be crustated all over like the inside of a tea kettle that hath been long in use. Besides several mossy productions that are still preserved by the dew, we see all over this channel a great number of holes, some of them four or five inches deep and one or two in diameter, the tively and demonstrable tokens of their having been formerly so many fountains. It likewise may be further observed, that art or chance could by no means be concerned in the contrivance: for every circumstance points out to us a miracle : and inthe same manner with the rent rock of Mount Calvary at Jerusalem neve fails to produce a religious surprize in all who see it."

POCOCKE.

" Here they show the Rock, which, they say Moses struck and the waters flowed out, when God told him he would stand before him upon the rock of Hareh, which was afterwards called Masiah and Meribah. It is on the foot of Mount Seric, and is a red granite stone, fifteen feet long, ten wide, and about twelve high. On both sides of it, towards the south end and at the top of the stone, for about the breadth of eight inches, it is discolored as by the running of water : and all down this part on both sides, and at the top are a sort of openings or mouths some dollars, said by Murchison to be assigned by Joseph Ducks- of which resemble the lion's mouth, that is worth, dee'd, and witnessed by Juo. Myrick, which note is semetimes cut in stone spouts, but 'appear not to be the work of a tool. There are about twelve on each side, and within every one is a horizontal crack, and in some also a crack perpendicularly down. There is also a crack from one o' the mouths next the hill, that extends two orthree feet towards the north, and all around the south end The Arabs call this stone, the stone of Moses.

In 1722, a person called the Profetto of the Franciscans in Egypt, made the same tour. His manuscript journal was afterwards translated by the Bishop of Clogher, the Rev. Ropert Clayton. He visited the same object, which ne says is called by the Greeks the stone of Fountains, and is considered the same that Moses struck with his rod. He described it as

" Which aforementioned stone is about twelve feet high, and about eight or ten broad, though it is not all of one equal breadth ; it is a granite marble of a kind of brick colour, composed of red and white spots which are both dusky in their kind, and stands by itself in the aforementioned valley, as if it has grown out of the earth, on the hand of the road towards the north east. There remains on it to this day the lively impression of the miracle then wrought, for there are still to be seen places whence the water gushed out, six openings towards the north west, and six openings towards the northeast : and in those places where the water flowed the clefts ar: still to be seen in the rock, as it were with lips.

ROME.

The observatory of Lucien Bonaparte, in respect to instruments, is unquestionably one of the most perfect in Europe .- Among others he possesses the Telescope with which Herschel made his most important observations, and for which he paid him 2000t. steeling. Lucien permits to men of science of this place, free access to his observatory, and Professor Scarpellini will soon publish a description of it and its instruments. The bust of Lord Byron, by Therwaldson, is a fine piece of workmanship:
