A HINT

TO all those whom it may concern, that I Merit Dilliard,
Public Ranger, for the County of Wake, having had
complaints made to me stating that divers persons to their cer-
tain knowledge had taken up Strays of different kinds and
had made use of them as their own, without entering them
on the stray books of their County as the law directs, several

MISCELLANY

FROM THE NEW-YORK NATIONAL ADVOCATE.

OLD KALEIDESCOPE.

Since I last wrote to you I have taken a
peep at the good city of Philadelphia, its charm-
ing streets, colleges and hospitals, museum and
academies, and may, one day, give you a de-
scription of all its beauties, mental, moral, and
agricultural, its arts, its butter, banks and puns;
in the mean time, I use my Kaleidescope to de-
scribe my departure.—Left Market street at
one o'clock—steam uncommonly high—thermo-
meter yet higher—cabin full of ladies reading
novels and tracts, some dozing, others chatting
—passed by numerous villas—shady walks—
Van Buren's mansions, an old Dutch Ambassa-
dor—Burlington, famous for hams and old
maids—Bristol for baths and turkeys—passed
by a country seat of Don Onis—flag, and ram-
parts—adored Ferdinand—Trenton, noble
bridge—good supper, bad beds—fine roads, spirit-
ed horses—Princeton—students great bucks—
seagars, rats, & pretty women—good auxilia-
ries to study—Brunswick—old inns—paved
streets and gothic mansions—push on, keep
moving—land on Staten Island, and got on
board the Nautilus. Here I took breath for the
first time, and gallantly handed the ladies on
deck to gratify them with views at once pictur-
esque & beautiful. A gentleman from the Ba-
hamas and a friend of mine, put himself under
my immediate protection, and I shook my Kalei-
descope to give him a view of surrounding ob-
jects. Our boat debouched from Robin's Reef,
and we were in the noble bay; there says I,
there's a view for you—Naples and Constanti-
nople, Etna and Vesuvius, Gulf of Lyons and
the adriatic, were miniatures in comparison.
There says I, moving my hand in semicircular
position, there is the quarantine ground famous
for its hospitals and health physician; there's
his house—snug birth—gives a ball occasionally;
very popular project—there's the signal pul-
agreeable prospect for the merchants—there's
the vice president's seat—intends building a
town—profitable position—there's fort Rich-
mond, celebrated as the temporary residence of
Governor Clinton and the mosquitoes, but more
so for a political turtle feast; there in the dis-
tance are the highlands of Neversink, and there
is Mount Mitchell, after a celebrated philoso-
pher of that name whose bones are in the Lyce-
um; there to the right is Long Island—good
soil and honest farmers though they do call
each other hard names—there is Castle Williams
Bedlow's Island, and a famous place for catch-
ing fish, called *Perka Michell's*. By this time
we arrived at the wharf and I pointed out the
battery—tall trees—little children, and pretty
nurses rolling on the grass—news-mongers at
the flag-staff—showed him the place where gen-
eral Scott intended to have built barracks.
There, says I, is the bowling green—City Ho-
tel—lots of strange faces. We took possession
of one of the splendid apartments, and swallow-
ed a glass of iced lemonade, while we looked at
the ladies in the circulating library opposite.
My Bahama friend, after yawning up and
down the room, in the true West India style,
and beating his black servant with the heel of
slipper, told me he was tired of the bustle of the
hotel, & desired to be recommended to a private
boarding house. Accordingly, I put a card in
the chamber of vision, and directed the Kalei-
descope into the dining room of a celebrated
boarding house in this city.—Fine order—neat
arrangements—good attention—dutchess of the
table, stiff as queen Elizabeth—rules too rigid—
ceremonies too oppressive—no sneezing and
