### IMPORTANT INVENTION

THE undersigned having obtained Patent for the invention of a Horizontal and Impedimental Water Wheel, is now at work, and being satisfied that observations drawn from theory and practice, are always governed by experiment, and through experience in his opinion of its operative power and general utility, by the most urgent necessities calls for; yet, rather than confide it to the publick, he is supported by the editor only, so determined to make a full and satisfactory examination of its operative power and general utility, on a scale that would test the principle beyond the possibility of doubt. He accordingly has built and erected at the edge of Elk river, (near Elkin, Elizabethton County West Tennessee,) a water wheel on the above plan, 30 feet diameter, with 12 arms, to which the discs, a foot by 4 in surface, are suspended by two wings, and supported by rods connected to the lower edge and the armature allows, in a way not to prevent the rotation of the float and fully unfolded. The float begins to roll up on the edge or that side of the wheel returning against the current, and is carried easily over an incline plane, by means of a small wheel or roller, fixed in the lower edge of the float, and pass of the plane so soon as the float can be raised by the current to stand upright. The inclined plane can be dispensed with in tide water; the cub and float rolling alternately on the different sides of the wheel, and without changing or altering its motion. The wheel is suspended by two arms, intended on one side and passing through blocks on the arms of the cog-wheel and retained by catches that are raised or lowered by levers to suit the different stages of the water, or to increase or diminish its operative power. The inclined plane rises and falls with the water. The current in the part of the river on which the above wheel is erected, varies from being brak, yet the wheel performs one and half revolutions in a minute, driving a stone of four feet diameter with great power and with a velocity of one hundred and twenty revolutions in the minute.

The proprietor will have full operation the ensuing summer, to a pair of stones and a few, all joined and driven by the same water wheel. The great advantage arising from this invention is the substituting the common current of rivers, for the usual quantity of water acting under a head, or taking down an height, and without a dam or any other obstruction to the current in rivers than a small triangular wharf, extending from the bank above, to limit the diameter of the wheel, to protect it against drift-wood, &c.

There are few rivers that do not afford a situation every mile or two for the erection of a wheel on the above construction, and thereby affording to Farmers living on such water, a facility of manufacturing their own grain, sowing up and rendering profitable accommodations on their ground, and in short is well calculated to profit all the various classes of manufacture, whether on a large or small scale, by increasing or diminishing the size of the wheel.

The premium for using the above described wheel, if obtained by the proprietor, will be two hundred Dollars; but it may be somewhat higher. To a privileged right will be allotted a exclusive, containing a full & accurate description of the parts, sizes, &c. composing the wheel, so as to render it intelligible and easily comprehended by the most ordinary property, it being extremely simple when seen or understood.
