## AMERICA AND GREAT BRITAIN.

The article recommended to our attention by  
a friend, so completely coincides with our own  
views of the existing relationship between this  
country and America that we have adopted the  
advice of our correspondent, by inserting the  
essay from the Scotsman, which is given entire,  
and is recommended to the particular attention  
of our readers. It is by such plain arguments,  
disengaged of all party feeling, that the people of  
England must ultimately be convinced, that the  
improvement of the United States, and particularly  
the westward extension of their increasing  
population, are matters of high interest to  
the civilized nations of the old world. It is  
true that the prosperity of Europe may find  
the means of strengthening itself by commercial  
transactions, and there the unfortunate and the  
selected will find asylums for ages yet to  
come.
