# DOCUMENTS.

OUR RELATIONS WITH STAIN.

The following is the correspondence between our Minister at Madrid and the Spons. First Secretary of State, which we heretofore promised, but have not been able, until now, to publish. The reader will observe it is of anterior date to a part of the papers already pabl shed, respecting our relations with Smin.

DOCUMENTS LAID BEFORE CONGRESS. Correspondence of Mr. G. W. Eroing. Ilinister Plenipotentiary of the United States at Madrid, and Don Jose Pixarro, First Secretary of Sta e, referred to in the President's Message of 17th of November, 1818.

Don Jose Pizarro to .ir. Erving. The first Secretary of State has the honor of rausmitting to the Minister of the United States, a copy of some paragraphs of a note of the 7th of Pebruary, 1803 (and propositions which accommunical it) to Don Pedro Cevallos. and he arai's houself of this occasion to repeat the assuran e o his consideration.

The Palace, 8th July, 1818.

Copy of some paragraphs of a note, directed to Dan Pedro C v dos. on the 7th of Ferruary, 1803, by Mr. Charles Pinckney, Minister of the United States.

" To opiain this, they have authorised me to sav, that, should his majesty be now inclined An assortment of best New-York stone wave retail, or | to sell to the U: ned States his possessions on the east side of the Mississippi, or between that and the River Mobile (agreeably to the propositions enclosed) the United States will make to his Majesty, and I do now make, in their name, the important offer of guaranteeing to him and his successors, his dominions beyond

" Propositions on the part of the United

" 1st. The United States will purchase the possessions of his Catholic Majesty, on the east side of the river Mississippi, for which they dollars.

2d. They will purchase these possessions, for which they will pay dollars, and moreover guarantee to his Majesty and successors, his possessions beyond the Mississippi.

" 3d. They will purchase the country between the rivers Mississippi and Mobile, belonging to his Catholic Majesty, and also places of deposit near the mouths of the other navigable rivers, passing from this territory through either of the Floridas, for which they will pay

acceded to, they will then purchase certain tracts of country on the Hanks of the Missignippr, and the rivers passing from their territory into that of his Cathone Majesty, for which they dullars, or enter into other obli gations which may be thought equivalent to the acquisition."

> Mr. Erring to Don Jose Pizarro. MADRIE, JULY 9, 1818.

Sim-I have had the honor to receive your excellency's note of vesterday's date, enclosing a paragraph from a note addressed to this goveinment, on the 7th February, 1803, by Mr Pincknes, at that time Minister of the United rates at L s Court ; together with certain proposa's of the same Minister, to which the paragraph cited refers.

Though I fi d that these proposals are as exicit in their form as your excellency, in conreation stated fliene to his yet, I also find, as I presented, that they were not made or renewed by the special mission which treated with Mr. Cevaffus in the year 1805, and that they do not aff ot, and cannot receive any application to the great questions now under consideration. They, in fact, offer the United States, as guarautre of his Majesty's possessions, on the right bank of the Massissippi, in part consideration for cessions which he was to make of the whole of his then possessions, or certain districts of them to the east aard of that river; but, p sterior to tois offer, namely, on the 30th April, 1803. the greater part of the territors thus proposed to be pure ased, and the whole thus proposed to er guaranteed, passed into the possession of and now make part of the United States. Thus, the state of possession in that quarter having been changed, the motive to guarantee on one side, and the necessity to receive a guarantee on the subject, theref r. is as though it were obliterated from the record . .
