Congressional Proceedings.

IN SENATE.

MARSHAL, April 24.

The following resolutions, submitted by Mr. Morril on the 21st inst. were taken up for consideration.

Resolved, That the practice of Duelling is inhumane, impudent, and censurable.

Resolved, That the President of the United States would be justifiable in striking from the rolls of the army and navy the names of all persons thereto who have been, or hereafter may be, directly or indirectly engaged in a duel, or who may have been, or hereafter may be, in any way or manner accessory thereto.

This resolution having been read, Mr. Morril proceeded, in a speech of considerable length, to support the principles which were laid down in the resolutions. When he had concluded,

Mr. Williams, of Tennessee, moved to lay the resolutions on the table, believing, in regard to the first resolution, that it was a waste of time to be arguing abstract propositions; that in regard to the second the President already had the power vested in him by law to do what was proposed; and that if he had neglected to execute the law, and it was intended to take any step in relation to it, he ought to be approached in a direct and open way, &c.

The motion prevailed, without a division, & the resolutions were ordered to lie on the table accordingly.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Smith, of Maryland, presented a petition of sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying that measures may be adopted to prevent citizens of the United States from engaging in the business of privateering under the flags of the governments in South America, and that certain ports in the United States be designated in which only cruisers of those governments may be permitted to enter, and that those lying on the waters of the Chesapeake Bay may be among those which may be prohibited; which petition was referred to the committee on Foreign Affairs.

On motion of Mr. Lowndes, it was

Resolved, That the Letter from the Secretary of the Navy of the 9th of April, 1820, with the documents which accompanied it, be referred to the committee on Naval Affairs; and that they be instructed to enquire into the expediency of providing by law that no commanding officer or other officer in the Naval Service of the U. States shall receive on board his vessel any gold, silver, or jewels, without orders from the President of the United States or the Navy Department; and that no officer, without such orders, shall transport as a passenger any person in the naval or military service of a foreign government engaged in war; and the committee of Naval Affairs are instructed
