NAMED Clinton (or Calborn) runaway from me on
the 24th of July. He is about 28 or thirty years
of age, five feet ten or eleven inches high, very black,
somewhat bow-legged, his face longer and narrower
than common, with a projecting forehead and chin.—
His eyes resemble an African's in redness, and sick-
er than common, deeper into his head than common; when frightened or
alarmed, stutters—it is believed that he has a small
scar on some part of his face and that there are some
marks of the whip on his back. He is fond of sports,
and follows the carpenter's trade. This fellow, I
am informed, was purchased in May 1817, by Mr. Jeremiah
Smith, of John G. Blount, Esq. of Beaufort, North-
Carolina, as agent for Leonard Henderson, Esq. of Gran-
ville, to whom the negro belonged. It is expected that
he will endeavor to reach Richmond, in Virginia, as he
says he once belonged to a Mr. Mayo of that place.

Should he be taken to Raleigh, he would be recognized
by William Greenhaw, esq. near that place. I am
of opinion that this negro, if taken, will not own his
rightful owner, or his own name. A liberal reward will
be paid for securing said negro so that I ge. him.
Whoever may take up this negro, or the jailor to
whom he may be delivered, will please write me immediately.
