NAVY COMMISSIONERS

SEALED proposals will be received by the Commissioners of the Navy, until the 1st day of July next, for the supply of 5000 barrels of BEAN MEAL, and 5000 barrels of FLOUR.

One thousand barrels of Lard, and one thousand barrels of Pork, to be delivered at the Navy Yard, at Charleston, Massachusetts, Brooklyn, New-York, and Newport, Virginia, the first day of May, 1825.

The said lard and pork shall be of the best and most approved quality. Of the lard, the hog, leg, round, back, and side, shall be cut into pieces of 100 pounds, as near as may be, so that twenty pieces make a barrel of two hundred pounds, or so best. Of the pork—whole, salted, and well lard—all the skulls, feet, hags, entrals, shall be excluded, and the tender of the hog, including any parts that are attached to each barrel, shall be so cut up as to contain eight pounds, as near as may be, in twenty-five pieces, which shall be packed in hundred pounds net weight of pork.

The whole of the said lard and pork shall be packed with the best clean coarse salt, in the Island, Isle of May, or St. Udo's salt, with a sufficient quantity of the best salt peter. The barrels in which the lard and pork shall be packed, must be made of the best seasoned white oak, or white ash, and fully hoops, and must be stamped "Navy Seal," and "Navy Yard," with the contractor's name, and the year when packed.

This whole of the said lard and pork shall be under the inspection of the Navy Yard, where the deliveries are to be made, or such other specification as the Commissioners of the Navy may direct; and when delivered shall be in perfect shipping order.
