Deferred Articles.

A vessel has arrived at Newport from a voyage of 3 years and 4 months, last from Coquimbo in 120 days, with 1,900 barrels of oil. She left at Co-quimbo, on the 20th of August, the Deligence, Jordan, of Portland, from Gibraltar. In consequence of some information given by one of the crew, that goods were on board, that were not in the manifest, a guard was sent on board the Deligence, who began breaking open the bales and boxes of goods, and damaging them. Capt. Jordan informed Capt. Kennon, of the U. S. Peacock, then lying in the harbor, of their conduct, who immediately sent an armed boat, and ordered the guard to quit the brig, and for his men to remain on board; the Governor then ordered Capt. Kennon to remove his men; but he returned for answer, that he obeyed to orders except from Com. Hull, and that the brig should not be searched unless they gave security for any damages they should commit.

Railway .- A new Railway of 25 miles, (the longest in England) from the Colleries in Durham co. to London, was opened in the beginning of October. A coach with the committee, 21 wagons with passengers, and 12 wagons with coal, weighing altogether about 90 tons, were attached to a locomotive engine, built by Mr. J. Stephenson, and the im-mense train travelled at the rate of about eight miles an hour! There was nearly 600 passengers .- Nat. Int.
