CONGRESS SENATE.

Monday, Jan. 30. The engrossed bill authorizing the printing and distribution of the Infantry Tactics, or Rules for the Exercises and Manoeuvres of the In-

fantry of the U. States, and the general regulations of the Army, and the engrossed bill for the relief of Wilkins Tannehill, were, severally, read a third time, passed and sent to the other House for concurrence.

The Senate took up, according to the order of the day, the resolutions proposing amendments to the Constitution, in regard to the election of President and Vice President of the United States; and, on motion of Mr. Van Buren, they were postponed to Monday next.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Monday, Jan. 30. Mr. Bartlett, from the Committee on Naval Affairs, reported a bill concerning the Naval establishment of the U. States; which was twice read and committed.

The bill proposes that the Naval Establishment shall consist of one Vice Admiral, two Rear Admirals, thirty Captains, thirty Masters Commandant, two hundred and twenty Lieutenants, ten Chaplains, fifty Surgeons, sixty-five Assistant Surgeons, fifty Purasers, twenty sailing-masters, four hundred and fifty Midshipmen, thirty Boatswains, thirty Sailmakers, thirty Carpenters, twenty sailmakers, and such number of petty officers, seamen, ordinary seamen, and boys, as the public exigencies may require, to be determined and assigned to the different Navy Yards, stations, and vessels in the Navy, under the direction of the President of the United States. The other provisions of the bill relate to matters of pay, detail of service, &c.]

Mr. Metcalfe presented the following: Resolved, That the President of the United States be requested to communicate to this House such information, documents, or correspondence, touching the invitation to be represented at the Congress of Panama, which has been received by this Government, from the Governments of Mexico, Central America, and Colombia, as may be communicated without detriment to the public interest.

This resolution, by the rules of the House, lies over one day for consideration.

The House then resumed the consideration of the bill making appropriations for fortifications—the question being on the motion of Mr. Forsyth, to postpone the bill; which after considerable debate, was decided in the negative—101 to 81; and the House adjourned.

Tuesday, Jan. 31. The resolution offered yesterday, by Mr. Metcalfe of Ky, calling on the President of the United States for the correspondence inviting this Government to take part in the Congress of Panama, was taken up, and occupied the House until a late hour when the further consideration of the subject was postponed until to-morrow.

The House then went into committee of the Whole, on the bill making further appropriation for certain Fortifications of the United States, for the year 1826; and the question being on Mr. Cocke's amendment, reducing the appropriation for fortress Monroe from 115,000 dollars to 80,000 dollars—

Mr. Cocke, of Tennessee, addressed the Committee, in a speech which continued till near three o'clock, in vindication of the amendment he had offered.

He was replied to by Mr. McDuffie, of South Carolina, when, the question being taken on the original sum of 115,000 dollars as reported in the bill, it was decided in the affirmative.

The committee then rose, and having obtained leave to sit again, the House adjourned.

Wednesday, February 1.—The bill from the Senate, authorizing the printing and distribution of the Infantry Tactics or Rules for the Exercises and Manoeuvres of the Infantry of the U. S. and the general regulations of the Army, received its second reading, and was referred to the Committee on Military Affairs.

The resolution calling upon the Executive for information respecting the Congress at Panama, again came up for consideration, when Mr. Livingston, of La, delivered a lengthy speech in favor of the resolution.

After Mr. Livingston had closed his remarks, the Chair declared the time allotted by rule, for the discus-
