Ran Away
From the subscriber, living twelve miles west from Raleigh, on the night of the 30th inst. two negro men, father and son, the former belonging to the subscriber, and the latter to Stephen Lowe. The oldest negro is named **Remus**—he is about 40 years of age, yellow complexion, has fine teeth nearly all decayed, and is very knock-kneed when he walks. He carried with him the following clothing, a blue broad cloth coat, a pair of grey, and a pair of white pantaloons, and a fir hat, entirely new; also a plaid Check, striped with green with sleeves in it. Remus has another mark, which will render it easy to identify him, if he is examined, viz. a very large scar on one of his legs. There is but little doubt that said negro has a considerable sum of money about him, and may therefore endeavor to pass for a free man, as was the case about 19 years since, when he ran away, took with him fire papers and assumed the name of **Chavis**.
