

REPORT ON THE BANKS.

To the Senate and House of Commons.

GENTLEMEN, In obedience to an act of the Legislature, passed at this session, appointing the Speaker of the Senate to represent the State in the meeting of the Stockholders of the State Bank of North-Carolina, and as a Director of that institution during the present session, I have the honor now to report, that I attended the meeting of the Stockholders on the first Monday of this month, and on the following days, who examined minutely the affairs of the Bank for several days, and reported thereon to the Stockholders on the 10th day of the Legislature, whose representative I was bound to be, and to the officers who have managed the institution, and after a laborious investigation of its concerns, they have appeared more correct and prosperous than I had reason to expect. The vigilance and ability of some of the Stockholders in the investigation of the affairs of the Bank, for one or two years past, have had a tendency to correct abuses and produce a salutary effect on the interest of the institution. The Bank at this time, I believe, may be pronounced as safe and as sound as any other institution of the kind: Its debt has been considerably diminished in the last year, and nearly four hundred thousand dollars of its notes withdrawn from circulation.

By the character of the Banks of this State, the Treasurer has a right to require of them annually a general statement of their condition: As I at this time, by appointment, represent the State instead of the Treasurer, I have called upon them for this statement, which, though delayed for several days in consequence of the distance of some of them from this place, has been promptly furnished. These statements are now laid before the Legislature, showing the condition of the State Bank of North-Carolina on the 20th of November, 1827; that of the Bank of Cape-Fear on the 7th of the same month; and of the Newbern Bank on the 31st of December, 1826, and on the 30th of June, 1827.

General Statement of the State Bank of North-Carolina, November, 1827.

Raleigh and Newbern Stages.
