On motion of Mr. Jennings, Samuel Spencer, Joseph Medley, Dr. R. M. Rietveld, John P. Bates, Clement Marshall, Adam Lockhart and Martin Pickett were appointed a committee to draft a preamble and resolutions expressive of the views of the meeting...

The period will shortly arrive when the citizens of Ason county, in common with the citizens of the United States will be collectively called on, as a portion of the freemen of the Union, individually to repair to the ballot box...
