> Mint of the United States .- From the annual report of the Director of the Mint, made to the President, under date of 1st January, it apprars that the comage effected during the year 1830, amounts to \$3,655,620, comprising \$645,105 in gold coins. \$2,495,400 in silver, \$17,115 in copper, and consisting of 8,351,191

pieces of coin, viz. Half Engles, Quarter Engles, Half Hollars, 136,351 making \$631,755 4,764,800 62,000 Dismes, Halt Dismes, 510,000 1,711,500 17,115 8,385,191 \$3,155,620

Of the amount of gold coined within the last year, about \$125,000 were derived from Mexico. South America, and the West Indies; 819,000 from Africa, \$466,000 from the gold region of the United States. and about \$33,000 from sources not ascertained.

Of the gold of the United States above mentioned, \$24,000 may be stated to have been received from Virginia, 204,000 dollars from North Carolina, 26,000 dollars from South Carolina, and 212,000 dollars from

Georgia. se la the last annual report, the rogressive development of the gold region of the United States was illustrated, by referring to the lucrease of the annual receipts from North Carofina, which, previously to 1824; had been inconsiderable; but from that year to 1829, inclusive, had advanced from 5,000 to 128.0 lars; and also, to the then novel occur-rence of gold having been received at the mint from Virginia and South Carolina, about 2,500 dellars having been received from the farmer, and \$,500 dollars from the latter. The past year exhibits, in relation to all those States, a conspicuous increase in the production of gold; and presents, also, the remarkable fact of 212,000 dollars in gold received from Geor-gia, from which State no specimen thereof had been presented at the

Temperature of the Barth.-It is stated that the evidence is accumulating in favor of the theory that the temperature of the earth increases as we descend below its surface. In some places, by means of natural and artificial excavations, the carth has been penetrated to the depth of 1600 feet. The result of the observations made in the different exeavations in different parts of the globe is, that there is " an increase of heat amounting to about 1' of Faurenheit for every 46 feet in death; that at the depth of 10,000 feet the heat would be sufficient to boil water, and that at the depth of about 100 miles, or one-fortieth part the distance to the centre, the mond, or any place to the most of the earths and stones that are known to enter into the composition of the globe, "
