stronger opposition to the democratic party than was ever before known in that State.
We are unable to give the political classification of the Georgia Legislature, but, on joint ballot, the Breckinridge party has 200, Bell, 80, and Douglas 25.
The new Mississippi Legislature is politically classified as follows, viz: Senate—Democrats, 28; whigs, 3; independent, 1. House—Democrats, 88; whigs, 6; American democrat, 1, and two vacancies. The vote for Breckinridge and Bell will be close.
Senate—Democrats, 25; Union, 7; republicans, 1. House—Democrats, 35; Union, 35; republican, 12.

THE NEW STATE GOVERNMENTS.
The Political Position of the Several States in the Present Crisis of the Union.
We publish below important statistical information, giving the political classification of the members of the Legislatures of the States that have held elections the current year. In the free States, it is almost unnecessary to say, they are republican, *ad nauseam*; in the slave States, as far as heard from, the Breckinridge element is largely predominant.

The United States Circuit Court for the District of North Carolina is held semi-annually at Raleigh, on the 1st Monday of June and last Monday in November.

The United States District Courts are held at Edenton, 3rd Monday in April and October, J. M. Jones, Clerk; Newbern, 4th Monday in April and October, Benjamin Brown, Clerk; Wilmington, 1st Monday after the 4th Monday in April and October, John L. Cantwell, Clerk.

The Supreme Court of North Carolina is held at Raleigh semi-annually, on the second Monday in June, and the 30th day of December. It is also held once a year at Morganton, Burke county, on the first Monday in August, J. R. Dodge, Clerk. The officers are as follows: Chief Justice, Richmond M. Pearson; Justices, David E. Caldwell, of Rowan; John L. Baily, of Orange; Jesse G. Shephard, of Cumberland; and Romulus M. Saunders, of Wake. Solicitors—Elias C. Hines, of Edenton, rides the First Circuit; George S. Stevenson, of Craven, rides the Second Circuit; William A. Jenkins, the Attorney-General, rides the Third Circuit; Thos. Ruffin, of Orange, rides the Fourth Circuit; Robt.
