That in order to provide, speedily, forces to repel invasion, and aid the Confederate States of America in maintaining the rightful possession of every portion of territory belonging to each Southern State, and to secure the public tranquility and independence against threatened assaults, his excellency, the Governor, by the advice of the military board, be and is herely authorized to employ the militia, military and naval forces of this State. and to ask for and accept the services of twenty thoussand volunters who may offer their services, either as cavalry, mounted riflemen, artillery or infantry, in such proportions of these several arms as he may deem expedient to serve for twelve mon hs a ter they shall be mustered into service unless sconer discharged with power on the part of the Governor to increase said volunteer force to the number of fifty thousand if the public exigences demand it. Sec. 2n 1. That the Governor shall arm, clothe and

That each company organized under this act shall consist of not less than sixty-four privates. nor mere than one hundred, unless the Governor shall otherwise direct, and each company shall be officered by one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, and one third lieutepant, who shall rank as brevet second lieutenant, to be elected by the vote of the company, and commissioned by the Governor, and four sergeants, and four coporals to be appointed by the respective captains.

An Act to create a Military Board. Be it en weed by the General Assembly of the State of North-Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the auth rity of the same, That there shall be a military board to consist of three persons, one of whom, at least, shall be skilled in mintary affairs. Said board shall be appointed by the Governor, and continue in office during his term of service, or until removed by him, whose duty it shall be to advise with the Governor relative to the appointment of all military and naval officers, or such other matters respecting naval and military affairs, as the General Assembly shall as-

sign to such board. SEC. 2. Be it enacted, That there shall be a principal offi er therein who shall have the charge and custody of all the rec r.ls, bocks, papers, and a counts appertaining to said board and shall execute and perform all such duties as shall from time to time be en raste ! to him by the G veruor relative to mili ary and naval affairs. He shall keep a record of the transa tions in his office and have supervision of all accounts an I returns of A lintant-General, Insp. ct > -General, Quartermaster - General, Commissary - General and Surgeon-General, or other military officers as may be

directed by the Governor. SEC. 2. Be it further enacted, That said officers shall be ex-officio, chief aid of the Governor, with the rank and pay of a col mel in the army of the Confederate Stat's of America, and be entitled the Military Secretary of the Executive Department, and shall have a clerk to be app inted by Lim, who shall receive a salary of one thousand dollars per annum.

Sec. 4. Le'it further enacted, That the Governor shall have power to convene said board from time to time, and whenever he may deem proper, and shall have power to fill all such varancies, as mov occur in said board by death, resignation or otherwic. SEC. 5. Be it further exacted. That the members of said board, other than the principal offi er, shall receive three dollars per day for each day they are ac-
