"Several gentlemen have arrived in town this week it in the northward, but bring no material advices: Nothing transpired from home with regard to the stamp act: Business goes on with them as usual; and their fear of seizures by men of war is so small, that they under-write the risque at Philadelphia for two and a half per cent. Or any voyage, except to Cape-Fear, that being the only spot on the continent where seizures of that fort happen."
