Legislative Power. There is to be a Council of State to

propole laws, which Council of State conflitutes part of the Executive Power. For the discussion of these proposed laws, there is a Tribunate, or a felect body of the Reprefentatives of the people; and a Legislative body to decide upon the propositions after they have been difcufled or affented to.

" The Legislative Body is to confist of 300 members : the Tribunate of 100; and the Council of ftate of 30.

Executive Power.

" There is to be a first or principal Conful invested with power to appoint and remove Ministers, Cenerals, Ambassadors, and Connfellors of State - There are to be two other Confuls to difcuts public matters in concert with the first Conful. They are to have but a confulative voice; their persons are inviolable. They are named for ten years ; they may be re-elected ; they will have a guard. The grand Confet will have 900,000 franks for falory. There are befides two Council of State, the one for the Department of Fereign effairs, and the other for the Home Department. The latter Council will have the midiative. It will have also to Judge and decide on litigated queftions in the department of the Admiralty. Such is the Government.

The Administration is confided.

1. To Minifers, or Councils of Admini-Aration, fuch as the Admiralty.

2. To Admigistrations of Communes of 20 fquare Myriametres, affilied by commiffioners to be named by the Confuls.

3. To intermediate Bureaus, charged only with the transmiffion of the orders of the Ministers, from the acts of the Administerative Bodies.

" The Confular Acts must be figned by a minister before they can be executed. The Ministers are responsible, each in his departe ment, for the execution of confular acts, which shall be contrary to the law, and for the non execution of Confular Acts agreeable to the law:

Judicial Power.

" It shall be afterwards organized by the Constitutional means established for the information of Laws.

Confervative Power.

" There is to be a body of, from 30 to 100 mombers elected for life .- They must have a qualification land rental of 25000 france a year. They name themselves to vacancies in their own body. A perfon muft be 40 years of age to be admissible. This body fhall exercise various functions.

" 1. They elect the members of the I. giflative Body and the Tribunate, and take them from the lift of the Notables of the pation, or elected of the third degree.

. . 2. They fhall pronounce on the uneonflitutional acts committed by the inviolable bodies of the Legiflative or executive pow-

" 3. They shall exercise the right of cenfore on the lift of the Notables of the marion, may every year redece one bugaredth part.

" 4. They are or they probably may become a Grand Jury to try the crimes of High Treason, imputed to the great responfible Fundinnaries.

" The Confuls going out of office, or on giving their relignation, shall enter of right

into the Contervative Body. "The manner in which the Confervative Power Ihall fill up vacancies in their own Body, is-Three candidates fhall be prefent\_ ed to them by the Grand Council, one by the Legislative Body, and one by the Tribunate.

" The Grand Council will be alone lodged

at the Luxemburgh, the two others in the palace of the 500. LONDON, December 14.

The affidance of Paul I. to Francis II. depends, at prefent, on the will of Suwarrow. We are informed that Mr. Wickham, count de Lehrbach and Prince Efterhazy, have u" nited their effort's to induce the old general not to abandon the Archduke to the mercy of an enemy much fuperior in number. They represented to him that he would expose himself to the darger of losing the title of Italicus, fince the French might re-corquer Italy if Mallena, after fubduing the Grifogs; fhould throw himfelf into the Milanefe with 30 or 40,000 men, and attack the armies of Kray and Melas, already threatened in front by the army of Championet. We do not know what effect thele remonstrances have produced in the mind of Sawarrow. To foften it fill more, the emperor has juft feut to him the following letter :--

" My dear field marfhal prince Italifky,

" count Suwarrow,

The Splendidactions which you have performed, during the course of this compaign, at the head of the army which I placed onder your command in Italy, have effured you the fuffiages and admiration of all Eutrope. By your victories you have rendered to me, in particulat, and my empire, important fervices, of which I fhall always retain a remembrance, with the most lively gratitude, and they give you the juffelt title to be semitted, as the man most proper to add luffre to it, into the order of Sr Therefa, established in my armies to reward their warlike bravery. Receive, then, the grand erefs of that order, as a tellimony of my high effeem and friendfhip. Receive, at the fame time, a commander's crofs, and fix croffes of chevalier, the formet of which you will give to General Panerslion, as an acknowledgment of his distinguished talents and courage. The reft are deflined for fuch of the officers of the Ruffian army, who were in Italy, whom you thall Judge molt worthy of them; your choice will add to their glo-
