Treaty between Rulia and Portugal.

The treaty of alliance, between Ruffia and fortugal, was figned at Peter fourg, the 21ft Sestember, 1799. The two contracting owers, mutually guarantee each others ollellions; they declare that their object is ot to do wrong to any power, but to conthate to their untral benefit and fecuricy, ad to the re-effablishment of peace in Enspe. It is flipulated that on the requisiin of either of the two powers, attacked th ir possedions, Rustra is at first to furin 6500 infastry, and that Portugal, on te other hand, is to furnish to Russia, a hadron, of 6 thips of war, five from 64 to hand a frigate of 32 or 40.
