HALIFAX, July 17.

Genos fill ho'ds out. The following extract of an official letter from Field Marfhal Lieutenant Count Hohenzollern to Major General de Nicoletti, Commandant of Milan contains accounts of the latest events in that neighbourhood.

Orcele, May 14. Yesterday I was attacked by the whole garrifon of Genoa, The conflict lafted feveral hours, and I never witneffed a more fevere engagement. We had the good fortune to deleat the enemy. Gen. Soult (the firft after Moffena) his Adjutant, a Colonel, and many officers were made priloners by us, about 1000 privates of the enemy's troops killed, wounded or made prisoners. Among the wounded is the Gen. of Division Hospitalet. Our loss amounts to about 240 men.

By Mr. Arthur Pagett's fervant, who arrived on Sunday from Palermo, Government allo received difparches from Lord Keinb, of a very recent date and of a confiderable im" portance: Ris Lordhip's difpatches after Stating the furrender of the cit del of Savona on the 14th of May, in confequence of famine, mention, that on the 19th of the fame month, the Magistrates of Genoz requested permission of General Ott to fend à flag of truce to General Melas, which was granted. The nature of the meffage was not known, but it is supposed to contain an offer to furrender up the city on certain conditions.

Mr. Jackfon's dispatches from Turin confirm the report of the march of General Melas towards Piedmont, for the purpole of attacking the army of Referve, before it receives additional reinforcements. Head-Quarters, Ulm, May 22, 1800: MY LORD.

Since the army croffed the Danube at this place on the 12th inft, the enemy has not ventured to undertake any move of confe. quence: in the night of the 18th he paffed the Danube, in confiderable force, at Erback, and the following day reconnoitred the polition of the Austrians, on the heights above the town, which he found fo formidable, that he re-croffed the Danube in the course of the night, and refumed his polition between that river and the liter, without attempting any thing.
