Head-quartere, Milan, June 3. f feer giving an account of the capture of Milan and Pavia, he fiys, the enemy, who disputed the passages of the Selia, and the Tefino, is retiring behind the Adda, to Lacco and Lodi. The principal force of Melas is fill on the right bank of the Po.

You will without doubt, be aftonished of bearing that the general is fill at Piedmont, and continues to act in the Livera of Genoa, whilft we are taking poff fion of Lombardy ; but the real object and force of the army have been concealed from him with fo much fucceis, and the troops have marched with fuch celerity, that he has been every where furprifed and beaten.

The general in chief has just learned, that the corps under General Moncy has paffed St. Gothard, and reached Vareza .- That of General Elthencourt, which has patied the Simplon, is at Valanza. The union of the whole army can meet with no more obliacles ; and the plan, not lefs fkilful than bolo, of the chief conful, is executed in all its parts.

The French people for the fecond time now break your chains The infancy of States is subject to forms and viciffitudes. The misfortunes you have experienced will not be useless to you ! You have learnt to appreciate the fnares laid by the enemies of your prosperity. They boafted of their refred for property, and they have plundered many families They pretended a warm zeal for religion, and they have given up ltaly to heretics and even to infidels.

Citizens of Cifalpine fly toarms, form your national guard, and fecure your towns from the incursions of the enemy! Can you be infensible to the glory of forming an independent nation! Forget then your quarrels; let your unanimous defire be that of confolidating powerful ftare - I ftall acknowledge none as the friends of liberry but those whom oblerve the laws, extinguish animoficies and honour misfortune. Cifalpine people, whenever your territory is delivered from the enemy, the republic shall be re-organized upon the firm foundation of religion, equality and good order .- Haften that moment by your energy,

A. Berthier commander in chief of the army of Referve, to the Chiet Conful.

MILAN, June 3.

" Citizen Conful, I have to give you an account of the movements of the army from the 30th of May, of its operations, and of its traits of bravery which it has diftinguithed ittelf.

Paffage and combat of the Teffino.

" General Murat, leaving Novara on the 30 of May, proceeded to the Tefino, which be had orders to crofs. He disposed his cavalry in such a manner, as to harrafs the enmy on that river from the lake of Como beyond Vigevano, whill Boudet's division, which was under his orders, appeared at the bridge of Buffalors, where the exemy had withdrawn their bridge of boats, and the passage of which was detended by some pieces of cannon. I had fent this divition to Vigevano.

" General Murat made disposition, the object of which was, to perfuade the enemy that his intention was to pala the Telino near Voltegia. Informed that he had fome boate concealed in a small arm of the Tesino, he ordered his artillery, a part of the cavalry, and the 70th demi-brigade to appear at the gate of Galeat, in order to furprize that pafe

" On the 31ft May, at day break, the oth was at the gate of Galeat, which the enemy defended with two howitzers and three eleven-pounders, which kept up a very warm fire of grape thot. General Morar placed his articlery in a proper polition, and return. ed the fire with equal sivacity. During this time the 70th carried the boats which were in the fmall arm of the Tefino. Soldiers carried thefe boats on their floulders, and palled them over to the other arm of the river. amidit a thower of grape thor. In confequent of the orders they received, the grenadiers shove their middle in tater, gained woody iffe, from which they could keep up an advantageous fire of mafquetry. General Murat ordered them to take that of the enemy in fank Under the protection of that fire, and by the aid of two boats, he paffed the river, and obliged the enemy to withdraw their artillery.

" Severat Imall boats collected on the op. polite bank, afforded the m ans of paffing o ver a battalion, which charged the cavalry, and protected the passage of the demi-brigade; the chief of brigade Duroc, was near. being drowned. Adjutant. General Gerard palled with the first troops The enemy fell back to the village of Tarbigo, received con. iderable reinforcements, commanded by General Laudin in person. .

" Adjutant General Gerard got poffession of the bridge in front of Tarbigo, and oppoled the lorties which the enemy's cavalry attempted to make against our infan ry. Night approached-Gereral Murat, feeling the importance of driving the enemy from their polition, ordered General Mennier to make a warm attack on Tarbigo-That general accompanied by the Cifalpine General Pino, attacked with impetuolity and carried the village at the point of the bayonet. After an obftinate defence he killed 200 men. and took 400 prisoners. We had on our fide 15 men killed and 50 wounded. General Murat then proceeded to Buffalors, which this movement forced the enemy to evacu-

" During the night we employed ourselves in building flying bridges. The night and the whole of the firft of June were fpent in patting over the divitions of Boudet, Loifon, and Victor, which proceeded the next day to Milan, of which General Worst will not feil to receive the keys -He forms immediately the blockade of the callle."

" After having pursued the enemy along the road at Breicia, General Loifon proceed. ed by a counter march to Cremons, for the purpole of feizing the numerous magazines which the enemy had in that place, of paffing the Po there and of joining the corps of Murat, which is at Placentia.

4. On the 5th General Morat advat.ced towards Placentis. The enemy defended the head of the bridge with a great quantity of artillery. It was taken polleffien of by Murat at 11 o'clock in the night, ard 100 men, who remained to guard the pallage, were made prifoners.

We have taken poffeffon of every bridge on the Po, except two or three on the fide of Placentia, which the enemy had time to deffroy;

" On the 6th, at 4 in the morning, Gen. Lannes occupied the celebrated polition of Stradella, and thus cut off the only means which the enemy had of making their come munications. The enemy feeling the importance of this polition, united their feveral posts, and attacked general Lannes with the greatest impetuofity. The 28th demirbrie gade has been covered with glory; the eyes my was put to the rout, leaving 200 derd, 300 prifoners, as many wounded, and fome waggons. They have retreated to Placene

" A part of the French army will be us nited to-morrew at Stradilla. No other refource remains for Meles but a battle, be has no means of retreating except through dleffandria."

JUNE 8, " General Loifon has proceeded to Brefcia, The Cifalpine legion, commande ed by General Lechi, took possession of the flotilla, which the enemy had on the Lact o Majore, paffectibe Adda of Lecco, went to Bergamo, and took 50 prifoners, and four pieces of cannon.

" corps of the enemy, in attempting to enter the castle of Placentia this day, was lurrounded and tak #.

" General Murat has intercepted a courle er from Melas with very important difpatche es, and took more than 200 prifoners at Placentia.

" The dispatches of General Melas to the court of Vienna announce that at the mre ment when the order arrived for General Ote to raife the blockade, Maffena fent a meffena ger offering a capitulation. It appears from the letter of General Melas, that Maffena has given up Genos, but that his army have not been made pritoners of war.

" General Elfnitz, who evacuates Nice, has not been able to effect his retreat by the Colla di Tende. By the intercepted letters of General Melas, it appears that Aleffandria is badly provisioned. It is thought that Gen. Melas will take fhelter in Genoa, if the firft events are unfavourable to him.'

JUNE 9. " General Dubesme has occupied Cremona, where he found confiderable magazines. General Elfnitz has been confiderably harraffed in his retreat by General Southet, who on the 2d and 3d took 1500 prisoners .- General Gorroup has loft his ar". tillery, and retired with very few men to Coni, the command of which place he has taken,
