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Late European advices, By the frip Hazard, arrived at New-York from London.

VIENNA, July 16.

The recruiting goes on with confiderable. activity, as well as Vienna throughout the hereditary fates. All the regiments are to be completed. The complementary troops are to be marched in different directions to repair to the armies : We are affured, that the army of Italy is already go, coo frong. -It is, however, hoped, that the armiflice will be followed by peace. Letters from Berlin announce the arrival of Count Coheazet there.

AUGSBURG, July 25.

Letters from Ratifbon flate, that in the night between the 24th and 25th of July, two couriers paffed that way ; one a Pruffian the other a Bavarian. They are faid to have been charged with difpatches for General Moneau, which it is believed, relate to a treaty with the Elector of Bavaria. It is reported that Ratifbon will be declared neutral. and that the troops of both powers will be removed from it to a diftance of fix leagues.

PARIS, August 4.

The return of Count St. Julin from Paris for Vienna, and the departure of cilizen Duros, firft aid-de-camp to the Chief Conful, for the fame capital, has given rife to a very natural luppolition that Prelin instites of peace are in a flate of forwardnefs. They lett Paris on the lame day, but did not travel in company Citizen Duroc arrived at Strafburg on the 2d initant, he is faid to carry with him the ulr timatum of the French Government, and to be authorifed to terminate the negociation, by ratifying a formal treaty of peace. It is, however, to be obferved that there is not. the fmailest remittion of industry in the hostile preparations either of France or Auftria. The Hamburg mail due on Sunday arrived on Thuriday, but the contents were molly anticipated by the French papers -- The fullowing article appears from Vienne, July 19. In our Court Gazette, under the bead of Germany, is the following pallage " . c. counts from Dreiden, fay, that two great foreign powers will no longer view with indifference the progrets of the French in Germany, and the ruin of the continent, to promote the advantage of certain maritime connections Our account from Egypt, by laft mail, fate the renewal of hofilities to have been even more calamitous than had been before reprefented : as, inftead of only ten thousand men having fallen in the battle with Kleber, the Turks loft upwards of twenty thouland by the fword, and by fublequent hunger, thirft and facigue in the defert ; whill the multitude attributed to thefe latter caufes the plague, which has made, and continues to make, the most dreadful bavoc in the remains. of the Ottoman army. Among the numeroas perfons who fell into the bands of the French general at the battle of Cairo. was Mir. Morea, fecretary to the Britifh embally at Couffiantinople, who experienced from Kleber, and from the other generals, the wolt diffinguifted attention and kindnefs. This gentleman hat been permitted to rejoin the Grand Vizier, with whom he was when our intelligence was written ; though from the flate of the army, we apprehend that he would not rafily find a place of greater danger. Several of the immediate attendants of the Grand Vizier have tallen victims to the plague. " The Paris papers of the 7th inclusive, received yefterday, are filed with conjectures of an immediate peace with the Emperor, and fome of them even jutimate a belief that the preliminaries are already concluded. The account of the detention of the Danifh frigate and her convoy, was on the 6th communicated by the Telegraph to Paris. where it is faid, Denmark, though goaded by Ruffis and Sweden, 18 averte to take any flep againft England from the apprehection of her eaftern poffeffions.

The object of the expedition which failed from Portfinouth on Wednesday, and comprifed about 10,000 foldiers, continues to te, as it ought, a prolound fecret. Every thing that diftinguished gallantry can atchieve may be expected from them.

The quadruple alliance, faid to be forming in the North, appears to engage a confidera. ble partian of public attention at paris Intelligence of the capture of the Danif frigate and her convoy was communicated by the Telegraph, frem Donkirk to Paris, on the 6th inft. It is fated that Ruffia and Sweden. cordially concor in the plan of an armed. neutrality sgainft the uncentroled maritime dominion of England, but that Denmarke is averfe to become a party to the confederacy, from the prudential confideration that fhe would thereby hazard the loss of her valuabie poffestions in the Esft and Welt. Indies, and the lucrative trade fhe bad carried on during the wer. Accounts frem Hamburg of the 26th ultime, affert, that all the attempts of Ruffia and Sweden to draw Dermark into the Lew alliance against England have proved fruitlefs. At Copenhagen it is added, they tremble at, the idea of rupture, which would expute the country and their continental pollefions to the relentment of the Englid. It is currently reported and generally credited at Hamburg, that the Court of Lordon is upon the point of a perfect reconciliation with the Emperor Paul. What unders this defirable event more credible is, that the armed neutrality is no longer the topic of. discourse. It now appears that the Portuguele Ambal+ fador had no orders to leave Petersburgh, but jufily apprehending fuch an event, had demanded leave of his Court to return home. An article from the Hague, of the 26th ult. fates, that the intillegence Srft circulas ted in Paris, of the departure of the Ruffian ambaffador from Conftantinople, is fully confirmed, by letters from Hungars and feveral places. All the Ruffians have alfo quitted that city. Letters from Conflantinople and Smyrus, sford new grounds to believe that Kleber is determined to maintain bimfelf in Egypte A fquadren of French and Spanish thips of war, confifting of eight fail of the line, and five frigates, has been feen entering the Mediterranean. It is conjectured that this is the fquadron which was flared to have failed from Breft aboat a month sgo, and that its object is to arrive at Egypt, by fleering clofe to the African coaft. LONDON, August 5.
