

Captain Swaine, and about 500 of the Cork militia, were surprised at Prosperous, county Kildare, by a considerable body of Rebels, and murdered. They like blue savages, quartered the unhappy gentleman, and burned his remains in a pitch barrel.

The present is the third instance of martial law being declared in Ireland in the space of near 128 years. The first occurred when James II. fled to Dublin, immediately after the battle of the Boyne, when a military execution was ordered to be put in practice against any person found out of his house after eight in the morning. The second was during the rebellion in Scotland.

DUBLIN, May 21.  
A Special commission, it is said, will be shortly appointed for the trial of Lord Edward Fitzgerald. The weapon with which his Lordship did so much mischief is of a curious construction. In the middle is a handle, with a bladder right and left, which cut and thrusts—of course, it cuts whether drawn to the right or left. It is scarcely possible to disarm a man of such a weapon, without depriving him of life.

Lord Edward, when brought to the castle, affected the politeness of a courtier, and declared that he was sorry for the wounds he had inflicted.—When conveyed to Newgate, he appeared to be entirely dispirited—his voice faltered—his complexion was deadly pale, and his eyes apparently fixed—but yesterday it was the opinion of his visitors that he was out of danger.

Two rebel uniforms were yesterday found by the High Sheriff in the apartments immediately occupied by Lord Edward Fitzgerald, at Murphy's, in Thomas street. Murphy, the owner of the house Lord Edward lodged in, was conveyed to Newgate along with his Lordship.

Colonel Lamm, who was seized lately at Baxton, and sent to Ireland, in the custody of the proper officers, reached Dublin on Monday last, and was immediately lodged in Keshmarchan goal.

May 22.—This City has had this day been in extreme agitation. In consequence of a letter addressed to the Lord Mayor by the Secretary, Lord Castlereagh, asserting that Government had received positive information of an intended rising of the People, for the purpose of subverting the Government, &c. a general seizure was made this morning, under the direction of the Magistrates, by the corps of Yeomanry, when a few pikes were collected, and lodged in the Ordnance stores. The search is still going forward.

Many persons on whom suspected arms, such as pikes, daggers, &c. &c. were not found, have undergone severe flagellations, &c. This discipline has not led to any discoveries; the Royal Exchange has been the place where punishments have been inflicted.

Early in last week, Lady Egalite, the natural daughter of the noted Philip of Orleans, and now Consort of Lord Edward Fitzgerald, was ordered to quit the kingdom, and she has made every arrangement to retire this day.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, has issued orders to all the General Officers commanding his Majesty's forces, to punish all persons acting, aiding, or in any manner assisting the Rebellion which now exists within this kingdom, and has broken out in the most daring and violent attacks upon his Majesty's forces, according to Martial Law, either by death or otherwise, as to them shall seem right and expedient for the punishment and suppression of all Rebels in their several districts; of which his Majesty's subjects are hereby required to take notice.

Given at the Council Chamber, in Dublin, the 24th day of May, 1798.

NOTICE.  
Lieutenant General LAKE commanding his Majesty's forces in this kingdom, having received from his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant full powers to put down the Rebellion, and to punish the Rebels in the most summary manner, according to Martial Law; does hereby give notice to all his Majesty's subjects, that he is determined to exert the powers entrusted to him in the most vigorous manner, for the immediate suppression of the same; and that all persons acting in the present Rebellion, or in any wise aiding or assisting therein, will be treated by him as Rebels, and punished accordingly.

And Lieutenant General Lake hereby requires all the inhabitants of the city of

Dublin (the great officers of state, members of the Houses of Parliament, Privy Councillors, Magistrates, and military persons in uniform excepted) to remain within their respective dwellings from 9 o'clock at night till 5 in the morning, under pain of punishment.
